We are happy to see one another with masks amidst social distancing to exchange stories while hunting for treasure in the inventory of dealers. Yet, please remember that many presentations are still available on virtual platforms with excellent speakers and considerable information.

Our Society continues to hold monthly virtual meetings with topics of interest given by speakers from inside and outside Canada. The RPSC Stamp Talks program, sponsored by Sparks Auctions, is being given in English or French on various topics. The speakers have been knowledgeable, engaging and well-prepared. Participation and engagement from the audience has been excellent and appreciated. The RPSC hopes that you will continue to participate in the programme.

ROYALE 2021 ROYALE

Royal 2021 Royale is a Virtual National Philatelic Exhibition conducted by The Royal Philatelic Society of Canada and is hosted by CANPEX. Entries will be accepted in both multi-frame and single frame classes. Specific information on exhibiting will be found in the Exhibition Prospectus. Any collector who meets the criteria outlined in that document is eligible to exhibit. Single frame exhibits achieving a level of vermeil or higher will be eligible to submit their entry to CAPEX '22, the International One Frame Exhibition, June 9-12, 2022 in Toronto, Canada. Since this is a virtual exhibition, there is a protocol in place for scanning your entry.

My thanks to John Sheffield and Steve Johnson of CANPEX, and to all the exhibitors and judges who are participating. It is anticipated that there will be single and multi-frame exhibits with a limit of 80-85 – including about 55 multi-frame exhibits.

CAPEX '22

Planning continues for the CAPEX international stamp exhibition in Canada to be held in Toronto on June 9-12, 2022. The assistance comes from many capable volunteers led by David McLaughlin and Charles Verge and the Canadian Association of Philatelic Exhibitions. You will be reading and hearing a lot more about this in the months to come. The RPSC will need volunteers to assist with a number of tasks at the show. Please let me know if you are interested.

SALONS, CLUBS ET RÉUNIONS PHILATÉLIQUES

Ils pourront déposer une demande d'inscription pour leurs collections d'un cadre ayant atteint le niveau vermeil ou un niveau supérieur à CAPEX' 22, le concours international « Un cadre », qui aura lieu du 9 au 12 juin 2022, à Toronto, Canada. Comme il s'agit d'une exposition virtuelle, un protocole de numérisation des inscriptions a été mis en place.

CAPEX '22

An international stamp show to be held in Canada is now less than a year away. It has been 25 years since we last experienced an international stamp show in Canada. Have you made plans to attend CAPEX '22 next June in Toronto?

Previous Canadian Philatelic Exhibitions (CAPEX) have been held in: 1951, 1978, 1987 and 1996.

I remember standing in a long, loooonnng line outside the main post office in Winnipeg on June 10, 1978 to purchase Canada's first souvenir sheet, issued on the occasion of CAPEX '78. Collectors were buying dozens, hundreds and even thousands of this Canadian philatelic first. Today, dealers are still buying these at a discount and using them for postage.

I also remember attending CAPEX '87 in Toronto, after finishing a business trip abroad. What a great experience. I'm looking forward to meeting philatelic friends next year. One aspect of any stamp show is the social gathering of philatelists from all walks of life and different levels of philatelic experience.

If you have not attended an international stamp show before, CAPEX 22 is a great opportunity to attend a show in 'our own backyard'. Start your planning now; time will go by fast.

CAPEX 22 will be the world's first International One Frame Stamp Championship Exhibition, and with 400-plus exhibits, the most significant showing of one frame exhibits ever. CAPEX 22 will also offer a philatelic literature class with a wonderful array of printed and digital literature in competition. The exhibition's bourse area will consist of more than 75 Canadian and International dealers, providing a full range of philatelic material for exhibition attendees. The show is being held at the Metro Toronto Convention Centre (MTCC) in the heart of Toronto's downtown entertainment district.





HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS PRINCE PHILIP, DUKE OF EDINBURGH AN APPRECIATION



How Elizabeth and Philip descended from Queen Victoria. *Illustrated London News*, July 19, 1947.

Warrant Officer Class I Richard Logan, Royal Canadian Air Cadets was presented to Air Commodore-in-Chief The Duke of Edinburgh at Buckingham Palace on July 21, 1958. He retired in 1999 as Executive Director of the Air Cadet League of Canada having worked closely with the D of E Scheme since its inception in Canada.

His Royal Highness Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh was likened to Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, the last Consort of a Queen of England who was responsible for supporting good causes. Fortunately, Prince Philip lived considerably longer and therefore was able to do a great deal more in the Commonwealth and in the international field.

Prince Philip's life and work was, by any reckoning, a remarkable story.

Prince Philip of Greece and Denmark was born in Corfu, Greece on June 10, 1921, to Prince Andrew of Greece and Denmark and Princess Alice of Battenberg. After his family was exiled from Greece when he was an infant, Philip was raised and educated in France, Germany and the United Kingdom. Commenting on his loneliness – his mother was ill; his sisters were married and his father lived in seclusion in the south of France – he later voiced: "I just had to get on with it. You do. One does." Reared chiefly in Great Britain, Philip was educated at Gordonstoun School, near Elgin, Moray, Scotland.

To appreciate his achievements, it is as well to begin with his service in the Royal Navy, which he joined after passing out from Britannia Royal Naval College, commonly known as Dartmouth, in January 1940. Although he was related to the Royal Family he was little known to the British public. He played a distinguished part during the Second World War and would, had circumstances permitted, have continued in the Senior Service with excellent prospects of rising to the top of his profession.

On one occasion in 1943 aboard HMS *Wallace*, which was engaged in the Allied landings in Sicily, the ship came under repeated bombardment at dead of night and its crew realized that they would probably lose their lives. It was then, Philip, second in command, conjured up a plan to throw overboard a makeshift wooden raft with smoke floats that would create billowing clouds of smoke interspersed with small bursts of flame that would create the illusion of debris ablaze on the water.

As he hoped, the German planes were fooled into attacking the raft while the *Wallace* sailed to safety under cover of darkness. According to Admiral of the Fleet Terrence T. Lewin, KG, GCB, LVO, DSC had Prince Philip continued his active service in the Navy, it would have been Philip who became First Sea Lord and not himself.

The circumstance which eventually decided otherwise was, of course, his marriage in 1947 to Princess Elizabeth, heir to the Throne. For the time being, however, he was able to pursue his career, prospectively for many years ahead.

In 1950, at the age of twenty-nine, he took command of the frigate HMS *Magpie* with the Mediterranean Fleet.

The untimely death of King George the Sixth in February 1952 brought about a profound change in his life. As the hus-

band of the new Monarch, he became her Consort in all her public duties; his promising career in the Navy was ended and aside from his duty to the Queen, he was, in every practical sense, unemployed.

This writer has often thought upon the difficulty that this change had for Commander the Duke of Edinburgh at the time. He was a man of action, holding strong views and above all possessing, in a marked degree, the qualities of leadership and exceptional ability. It was no surprise that given those attributes, and despite the constraints imposed upon him, that he resolved the matter of his future so successfully.

To his biographer, Tim Heald in "The Duke: A Portrait of Prince Philip," he prescribed for himself, at this critical time in his life, as being to use his position "to attract attention to certain aspects of life in this country, and ... this might help to recognize the good things and expose the bad things. I also believe that I might be able to start certain initiatives."

From the very beginning, his allegiance and service to the Queen was his overriding priority. Unquestionably he fulfilled that duty in an impeccable manner. In so doing, it was apparent to Royal Watchers at all her public functions that Prince Phillip added a touch of informality, even in the most formal

occasions, as he created rapport with high dignitaries and humble folk alike. He was a marvelous Consort to Queen Elizabeth the Second and played a part in bringing the Monarchy closer to the people.

With respect to the objectives which he had in mind, Prince Philip began that other task at a propitious moment in history. It is important to recall the euphoria among the people of the Commonwealth when the new reign was ushered in. The war had not long ended; there was a climate of hope for the future, greatly enhanced by the attractive Royal Couple at the head of the British Empire. People spoke of “an Elizabethan Age,” of new ideas and initiatives, of Great Britain with an important part to play in reconstruction after the devastation wrought by six years of conflict. For many people, the Queen and Prince Philip epitomized this new spirit.

It was on this high note Philip began “to attract attention to certain aspects of life” and “to start certain initiatives.” He invigorated and inspired those engaged in each activity and enterprise whether they were in the realm of science, engineering, the environment, the humanities or sport and recreation. Despite the limitations of his available time, he made himself a part of these “aspects of life.”

One of his great gifts was that of identifying himself with the people he met, putting them at their ease, in whatever con-

text and at whatever level. That gift was greatly enhanced by his lively sense of humor, making people laugh.

Typical was in 1995, when Philip riffed on a widely held but oversimplified perception that Scots enjoy the drink, asking a driving instructor in Scotland: “How do you keep the natives off the booze long enough to pass the test?”

Among so many aspects of life to which Philip attracted attention, it might seem invidious to choose any of them which should have pride of place. This writer ventures to suggest that those concerns which bear on wildlife and the environment which they inhabit, and the consequences on the future of life on earth of man’s acquisitiveness and inventive genius, were matters of deep significance to him.

Yet another cause dear to his heart were the cadet units in the Commonwealth for training youth between the ages of twelve and eighteen years of age. Early in the period of transition from Service to Royal Life he was, for example, made Colonel-in-Chief of the Royal Canadian Army Cadets, Air Commodore-in-Chief of the Royal Canadian Air Cadets, and Admiral of the Royal Canadian Sea Cadets.

As regards those “certain initiatives” which he spoke about to his biographer, one was typically bold – The Duke of Edinburgh’s Award Scheme.

This scheme, started in 1956 in the United Kingdom, was not immediately welcome in certain areas of the education establishment. However, since that time, 5.5 million awards have been gained in 160 countries and territories. As this is written, more than one million young people are striving to achieve Bronze, Silver and Gold Awards in 130 countries and territories.

Philip sent his friend, Percy Ash, to approach the Air Cadet League of Canada in 1962 requesting assistance in establishing the award scheme in Canada. The result was a pilot project started in 1963 using the training program of the Royal Canadian Air Cadets in cooperation with the Royal Canadian Air Force and the Air Cadet League of Canada in all provinces. In addition, various schools, universities and YMCA's participated and supported the scheme.

Commander George Manson, an old friend and shipmate of Philip, was named Executive Secretary of the scheme in Canada, and, long story short, in 1964 forty-eight Bronze and six Silver Awards were presented. At the first Gold Award ceremony in Ottawa in 1966, His Royal Highness presented eighteen recipients with their Gold Awards and told the achievers' parents and guardians that "I hope it has made them aware of a lot of valuable things they can do in their spare time."

Since that time, an estimated 500,000 young Canadians have participated in the award scheme, which is now known as The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award – Canada.

Most people retire in their sixties or early seventies, but not Prince Philip. Philip performed his last official engagement on August 2, 2017, at the age of ninety-six.

Following the announcement, a well-wisher remarked "I'm sorry to hear you're standing down." Quick as a wink Philip replied, "Well, I can't stand up much longer." He had, on that day, completed 22,220 solo engagements and given 5,496 speeches in his travels to more than 76 countries according to Buckingham Palace. He also authored 14 books, served as patron to 785 organizations and made 637 or so overseas trips.

Prince Philip undoubtedly enjoyed his life's work, and all those of us who observed him carrying out his exacting engagements over the years admired him for performing so well the tasks he set himself. ☒

THE P & O STEAMSHIP LINE

- *Sea Post Office Mail*

During the nineteenth century, many efforts were made to speed up the mail, both nationally and internationally. The British East India Company had been established in 1600. At the beginning of the 19th century, the quickest route from England or Europe to India and further East was by sea to Alexandria, followed by a land route to Suez, and then by sea from Suez, rather than the long sea route around the Cape of Good Hope. In 1840, the Peninsular Steam Navigation Company was awarded a contract for mail service between the United Kingdom and Egypt, with the condition that within two years they establish a steam ship service capable of carrying the mail onward from Egypt to India. The company required considerable capital and became a limited liability company on December 31, 1849 as The Peninsular and Orient Steam Navigation Company (P&O).

The India service started in the autumn of 1842 and by 1844 there were regular services between England and Alexandria and Suez to Ceylon, Madras, Calcutta. In 1854, the P&O obtained the Bombay Mail service from the ailing East India Company. The journey time could be further reduced by travelling to Brindisi in southern Italy by rail and then by sea to Alexandria. The route from Alexandria to Suez was initially overland, and partially by water via Cairo, or latterly by rail. The Suez Canal between Port Said and Port Tewfik, Suez officially opened in November 1869, allowing ships to travel from the Mediterranean Sea to the Red Sea and continue on to the east. A steamer entering the Suez Canal is seen in Figure 1. From Bombay, mail could be transhipped to destinations further east, such as Japan and Hong Kong. Some of the steamers carried on to Australia.

Between Suez and Bombay, a stop was made in Aden (now Yemen) (Figure 2) for coaling at Steamer Point (Figure 3). The

Aden Post Office was part of the Indian Post Office and became an important exchange point for East African mail, as well as for four other countries operating through the Red Sea.

The Suez–Aden–Bombay Sea Post Office service was introduced in 1869 to speed up the mail deliveries. Until 1888, teams of Indian sorters boarded the steamers at Suez and sorted the mail prior to arrival in Bombay, applying the Sea Post Office cancellation. After 1888 the sorters operated between Aden and Bombay, until the Sea Post Office sorting service terminated in August 1914 on the outbreak of the first World War. There were at least twelve different cancellations.^[1] The letters represent a sorting team, initially A to F, which was reduced to three, A to C, although the number of teams was not reduced. The service was similar to that of the railway traveling post offices, RPOs in North America or TPOs in Great Britain.

During the period of operation of the Sea Post Office, the General Postal Union (GPU) was formed in 1874, and later the Universal Postal Union (UPU) in July 1875. Great Britain was a charter member of both the GPU and the UPU. India joined the GPU on July 1, 1876, and became a member of the UPU. Stan-

standard rates were applicable to UPU member countries. During the period 1879 to September 30, 1891, mail to UPU countries could be surcharged for long sea routes, and all mail to destinations east of Suez was surcharged. Several examples of the Sea Post Office cancellations are shown, mainly to and from India. Covers are usually backstamped Sea Post Office, but on post-cards all the cancellations are normally on the address side.

MAIL UK TO INDIA

Postal stationery post card, with a brown letterpress 2d stamp (Figure 4), was mailed from Bedford, England and Wales office number 61, AP 22 86, Sea Post Office B, 29 APR 86, arriving in Mhow in the central provinces, MY 11 86. It was redirected to Bombay (Mumbai) as the North Staffordshire Regiment was now in Bombay. From 1880 the postcard rate was 2d, and the card shows the correct use of the 2d postal stationery postcard.

A mourning cover (Figure 5) mailed during the surcharged rate period, 5d/½oz, with two blue 2½d stamps, from Aberdeen, SP 1 81, Scotland office number 1, Sea Post Office A 8 SEP, arrived in Simla (Dr. Ambedkar Nagar), Pradesh, the summer capital of British India, SEP 21.

Lettercard (Figure 6), mailed from the High St. B.O. Tunbridge Wells, England and Wales office number 820, AU 5 92 to Grindley Groom and Co., Bombay, bankers and general agents. It has a Sea Post Cancellation A AU 16 92. Lettercards were intended for inland use but could be upgraded for overseas. A Jubilee 1½d stamp was added to make up the Postal Union standard 2½d/½oz rate.




Figure 7. Cover to Poona, 1902.

Imperial Penny Postage was introduced on December 25, 1898 for British mail to various parts of the Empire. The 1902 cover (Figure 7) with two ½d green Jubilee stamps was mailed at the Imperial Penny Postage rate, 1d/½oz, on 24 DE 02, Sea Post Office C JA 5 03 arriving Poona 11 JA 03.

The Edinburgh picture post card, NO 14 01, with a penny lilac stamp to Toungoo, Burmah (Mynamar) 6 DE 01, has a Sea Post Office B cancellation NO 24 01 (Figure 8). Post cards con-

continued to be charged the UPU rates. St. Luke's Mission in Toungoo was a school run by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, a British Anglican missionary society.

INDIA MAIL FROM CANADA

The 1899 Canada postal stationery 2¢ cover to Madras (Chennai) was uprated with a 2¢ Map stamp, two different 2¢ provisionals and one 2¢ Numeral for the old registered rate. The registered rate was 7¢ from January 1, 1899. It was mailed from Shediac, New Brunswick, AUG 28 1899, went via St. John, NB, London (SEP 6), Sea Post Office B (SEP. 18), Triplicane (SEP. 25) and Mylapore (SEP. 25), both areas of Madras (Figure 9). The addressee, Prof. W.H. Wilson, was Professor of Chemistry at Presidency College, University of Madras (Chennai). One of his most distinguished students was C.V. Raman, winner of the 1930 Nobel Prize in Physics for his discovery of the Raman Effect.

The postal stationery one cent postcard, uprated with a 1¢ Small Queen for the 2¢ UPU rate from Orillia, 17 DE 04, Sea Post Office C 9 JA 95 to Calcutta (Kolkata) (Figure 10).

OTHER MAIL TO INDIA

The service on the P&O steamers was not restricted to mail between Britain and India. The UPU picture post card from Mexico (Figure 11), AU 16 1907, with a red 4 centavos stamp, to Bombay has a Sea Post Office B cancellation, SE 15 07. Mail was probably transhipped in England.

UK MAIL TO PERSIA

The 1892 cover from David Sasson & Co. (British - India Merchants, 12 Leadenhall Street, E.C., London), FE 19 92, (Figure 12) to Isphahan, Persia (Iran), was sent via Brindisi and Bombay and has Sea Post cancellation A MARCH ? 92.

MAIL FROM INDIA TO UK

A picture postcard (Figure 13) from Cawnpore Oant (Kanpur), 20 NO 08, with a red 1 anna Edward VII stamp, to 102 Shakespeare Street, Nottingham has a Sea Office cancellation, 21 NO 08, which clearly indicates BOMBAY - ADEN in the lower half. The Siege of Cawnpore was one of the key episodes in the Indian rebellion of 1857. Incidentally, my great-great grandfather, Reuben Watson, had his actuarial practice, Reuben Watson and Sons, the world's oldest actuarial firm, now Tower Watson, at 40 Shakespeare Street at that time.

The 1903 underpaid post card with ½ anna stamp from Rangoon (Yangon, Myanmar) 2.FE.03 to Burton on Trent, FE 22 03, Sea Post Office C FE 7 03, charged 1d Postage Due by Foreign Branch (Figure 14).

Cover from Glade & Co., a trading company in Bombay, to the German Transport Insurance Company, mailed OC 31, to Berlin, 14.11.96, (Figure 17) went via Italy, presumably Brindisi, Sea Post Office C OC 31 96. It has two green 2 annas 6 pies stamps, double the basic UPU rate.

The writer of the Egyptian 1904 picture postcard to London, showing a steamer entering the Suez Canal (Figure 1), en route to Burma (Myanmar), has a 1 anna Indian stamp, Sea Post Office A DE 30 05 (Figure 15).

The one and a half anna UPU postal stationery post card was mailed from Karachi on 7 JA 97, Sea Post Office A JA 9 97, to Hotel Breuer, now Golf-Hôtel René Capt, Montreux, Switzerland 21. 1. 97 was probably transshipped in Brindisi (Figure 18).

MAIL FROM INDIA TO EUROPEAN DESTINATIONS

A 1½ anna British India UPU post card (Figure 16) from Bombay, 18 MY 95, with a squared circle cancellation, has a Sea Post Office B cancellation on the day of mailing. It was received in Düsseldorf, Germany, on 3.6.95. As there are no additional postmarks, the routing to Germany cannot be determined, but it could have been sorted into a Germany bag which was sent on by train from Brindisi.

New York (Figure 20). Mailed 3 SE 03, the cover has an orange embossed 2 anna stamp overprinted 1 anna, and mixed reigns adhesive stamps on the back for a total of 6½ annas, Queen Victoria ½ anna, Edward VII green 4 anna and red 1 anna. The Sea Post Office C cancellation is SE 5 03, arriving in New York 9-27, 1903. ☒

MAIL FROM INDIA TO USA

The 1897 postal stationery cover from Janumpet, with an orange 2 annas 6 pies embossed stamp, to Tremont Temple, a Baptist Church, in Boston (Figure 19), back stamp Sea Post Office C MY 8 97, was transshipped in either Brindisi or England. It was received in New York, JUN 4 97, and in Boston on the same day.

The 1902 AR (Avis de Réception) registered postal stationery cover from Calcutta to the Journal Publishing Company Ltd.,

THE 1948 CYCAD STAMPS OF RYUKYU

BY DALE SPEIRS

The Ryukyu Islands, of which Okinawa is the most famous, were variously an independent kingdom, Chinese controlled, and then Japanese. After World War Two ended, the islands were under American control until 1971 when they were integrated into Japan. The first issue of stamps for Ryukyu was commissioned in 1947 and the stamps delivered the following year.

These were pictorial stamps, but duplicated some vignettes for different values. This was not unusual, as many countries have repeated the same design within a single set of stamps. When they did so, the standard procedure was to use one die for the vignette and a separate die for each numerical value. The Ryukyu stamps, however, had each common design re-engraved completely.

Two of the 1948 Ryukyu stamps depicted a clump of *Cycas revoluta*, a common species in the islands. The 5-sen value was reddish-purple and the 20-sen was light green. At first glance they appear identical except for the frame containing the inscription and value tablets. Closer inspection reveals that the vignettes were redrawn completely instead of using one die.

The easiest method is to count the fronds in the tall centre plant. The 5-sen plant has six fronds while the 20-sen plant has only five. Another easy-to-spot difference is that the 5-sen stamp has horizontal lines for the background, while the 20-sen has a speckled background. ☒

Robert McCormick

A British Royal Navy ship's surgeon, explorer and naturalist

(July 22, 1800-October 25, 1890)

Robert McCormick was born in Great Yarmouth, England. His father, also named Robert McCormick, was from Ballyreagh, County Tyrone and also a ship's surgeon. Sadly, for him, Robert's father was drowned in a shipwreck in 1817, leaving his son without influence and financial means.

McCormick seems to have had an abrasive character and went through life feeling unappreciated. From 1821, he studied medicine under Sir Astley Cooper at St. Thomas's Hospital and at Guy's Hospital. He gained his diploma in 1822 and in 1823 joined the Royal Navy as an assistant surgeon. He served in the West Indies for two years before being invalided home after contracting yellow fever.

After a year in a North Sea cutter, he became assistant surgeon on the Royal Navy bomb vessel, HMS *Hecla* in 1827 under William Edward Parry, joining Parry's expedition searching for the North Pole. Although Parry failed to reach the Pole, he did reach the farthest northern latitude recorded of 82°25'N – a record that stood for 50 years. McCormick, though, was left on Spitzbergen Island collecting samples and making notes about the natural history. Three commissions abroad followed, and in each case, he felt unappreciated and was "invalided home". In Naval terms this implied personal dissatisfaction or disagreements.

Early in 1830, he took leave on half pay and attended natural history lectures at the University of Edinburgh as well as classes in medical practice, midwifery, some botany and chemistry and tuition in surgery.

In May 1831 McCormick was back in London, where Admiral Francis Beaufort was looking for suitable personnel for a survey expedition to South America. Seeming well qualified, on July 9, 1831, he was recruited as ship's surgeon on

the second voyage of HMS *Beagle* under Captain Robert Fitzroy. It seems that McCormick was expecting to put together a sizeable natural history collection with a view to gaining himself fame and social advancement. During the preparations for the voyage, McCormick met Charles Darwin, nine years his junior and fresh from Cambridge University, who would be sailing as a self-funded gentleman naturalist and companion to Captain Fitzroy.

Darwin wrote telling his university tutor John Stevens Henslow about McCormick: "*My friend the Doctor is an ass, but we jog along very amicably; at present he is in great tribulation, whether his cabin shall be painted French Grey or a dead white - I hear little excepting this subject from him.*"

The first landfall was at St. Jago in the Cape Verde Islands in January 1832. McCormick and Darwin walked the countryside together, and Darwin found the surgeon's approach old-fashioned. "*He was a philosopher of rather antient date; at St. Jago by his own account he made general remarks during the first fortnight and collected partic-*

ular facts during the last.” McCormick became increasingly frustrated as Fitzroy took Darwin onshore, leaving McCormick behind without opportunities for collecting. It seems that Fitzroy liked Darwin and not McCormick. A prime example occurred when the ship visited the “unexplored” shores of St. Paul’s Rocks. Darwin was in the first boat to go ashore. According to Janet Browne in her biography of Darwin, McCormick was stuck in the second boat, which apparently was waved away and told to circle about catching fish for dinner. The last straw came in Rio de Janeiro in April when Fitzroy arranged for Darwin’s collection to be packaged and sent back to England. McCormick was invalided home.

In his memoirs written in 1884 McCormick recalled, “*Having found myself in a false position on board a small and very uncomfortable vessel, and very much disappointed in my expectations of carrying out my natural history pursuits, every obstacle having been placed in the way of my getting on shore and making collections, I got permission from the admiral of the station here to be superseded and allowed a passage home in HMS Tyne.*” (McCormick, 1884: 2: 219).

Captain Fitzroy does not seem to have even mentioned McCormick’s departure, although Darwin notes “*I take the opportunity of Maccormick returning to England, being invalided, ie. being disagreeable to the Captain & Wickham. – He is no loss.*” (Burkhardt and Smith, 1985: 225)

After leaving the *Beagle*, McCormick served as surgeon and naturalist with James Clark Ross, who commanded the two bomb vessels HMS *Erebus* and *Terror* on his four-year expedition to the Antarctic. Joseph Hooker was the assistant surgeon on the voyage and was also a naturalist, who became far better known than McCormick.

McCormick should have organized and catalogued the large collection of specimens and zoological materials from the expedition, but apparently lacked both the drive and skill for the task, which was performed by others under instruction from the Admiralty.

McCormick’s last voyage was in 1852 as part of Edward Belcher’s squadron searching for the lost Franklin expedition. He managed to be put in charge of a whaleboat, which he aptly named *Forlorn Hope*. He sailed this boat up the coast of an island in the Arctic Archipelago looking without success.

Almost throughout his career, McCormick seems to have been frustrated and disappointed in his expectations. He was, however, awarded the Arctic Medal in 1857. His final promotion occurred in 1859 with the designation of deputy inspector-general. He was placed on the retired list in 1859 and awarded a Greenwich Hospital pension of £80 per annum.

In 1884 McCormick published, at his own expense, his memoirs entitled *Voyages of discovery in the Arctic and Antarctic seas, and round the world.* Sampson Low, Marston, Searle and Rivington London (1884) Sadly, for him, although technically competent and with interesting content, it was published too late because the information was already too well known and the locations too remote to arouse much interest in the literary world. It is perhaps significant that no mention is made in the book of the *Beagle*, Captain Fitzroy or Darwin.



Although McCormick amassed a large collection of fossils during his Arctic voyages in search of Franklin, it never received public attention, largely due to his scientific shortcomings.

McCormick had several natural features named after him in the Antarctic, Cape McCormick. In the Arctic, McCormick Bay and McCormick Inlet, and in northwest Greenland, a valley. McCormick also had a south polar skua named after him, which he had shot on Possession Island, Victoria Land. It seems that McCormick had a passion for shooting birds and the skua, being a noisy, distasteful scavenger, was perhaps appropriate to be named after him.

In 1985 The British Antarctic Territory issued four lovely lithographed stamps featuring naturalists, one of which included Robert McCormick on a 7p stamp (Scott 125). ☒

HUMBOLDT, Saskatchewan

BY HAL KELLETT

Humboldt is located 113 kilometres east of Saskatoon in what were once the North West Territories. It began as a telegraph station on the Carleton Trail, a wagon route that was used by immigrants to travel west to Fort Edmonton from Fort Garry. The name 'Humboldt' was approved in 1875 for the first telegraph station in the territories along the Canadian Pacific Telegraph Line. Built in 1878, the Humboldt Telegraph Station played an integral part in communications for the developing west.

During the Riel Rebellion it was a site of strategic significance as it was the only communications link between Prime Minister John A. Macdonald and his forces in the west. As a result, a small force of North West Mounted Police was assigned to guard the telegraph station against a possible attack by the Métis. General Frederic Middleton arrived at Humboldt in April, 1885 with 950 soldiers. They established a garrison at the station and used it as a base for scouting operations.

Humboldt was named after the German explorer Alexander von Humboldt. From its inception, it was primarily German Catholic, settled by people of German and Russian-German extraction. Promoted by the German American Land Company, immigrants to the area came from the northern plains state of

the U.S. and from Germany. The post office was only open for two months, from July 1 to September 1, 1905.

The town is now on the CN rail line, and has become a centre for farming equipment sales and supply businesses. The population in 2011 was 5,678. ✉



The CNR arrived at Humboldt in January, 1905, so this letter (Figure 3) went by train to Humboldt.

PRECANCEL STAMPS and

Unauthorized

PRECANCEL COVERS

BY LAWRENCE PINKNEY

The first officially precancelled stamps were authorized by the post office in 1889. The first authorized precancelled stamps, labeled “Style A” to “Style N”, were a variety of bars and dashed lines. These various styles, along with the more modern city styles, are very well illustrated in both *The Unitrade Specialized Catalogue of Canadian Stamps*, and, in much more detail, in *The Standard Canada Precancel Catalogue* (which has recently been updated to its 8th Edition). Boggs, Jarrett, Reiche, Walburn and Manley, in particular, also referred to various precancel stamps in their own books. Much of this article is a summation of various statements that each author and/or each editor has made in these various books and catalogues. The last of the precancelled stamps were issued on the 1977–1983 Floral Definitives.

Stamps were precancelled to save the post office the time of cancelling individual pieces of mail. Precancelled stamps were sold in bulk, (usually at a small discount) to “approved” commercial firms and accepted only on bulk mailings from those commercial firms. Precancelled stamps were very specifically not to be used on first class postage.

The first precancelled stamps may have come from the Ottawa, and from the St. John, post offices in 1888 – before the post office officially authorized precancelled stamps. Also, what would a (usually) smaller post office do, particularly with a commercial firm, if that post office was not on the approved list? Many such post offices did precancel stamps on their own authority.

These became known, in the philatelic world, as “unauthorized precancel stamps and unauthorized precancel covers”. This article is but a part of their story.




Figure 1. The first so-called precancels.

The appearance of two different types of overprints in 1888 must be regarded as the first attempts to precancel Canadian stamps. Some of the 1 cent, 2 cent, 3 cent and 5 cent denominations of the Small Queen issue were cancelled early in 1888 with a numeral “1” within parallel lines at Ottawa. Later, in the same year of 1888, St. John, New Brunswick used a precancel consisting of a numeral “1” in a circle, within fourteen lines [Figure 1].

A third “unauthorized precancel stamp” consisting of lines drawn across the rows of the 1 cent, 2 cent and 3 cent of the Small Queen issue with a pen was done in Toronto, but the Precancel Committee (composed of H.G. Walburn, J.E. Kramer, H. Reiche and T.A. Stott; most being located in Ottawa) was unable to determine if these were true precancel stamps.

It is also known that the Millbrook postmaster cancelled sheets of the 5 cent Beaver in advance, placing them on letters as they were brought into the post office. The Belleville Postmaster is also known to have followed this procedure.)

A fourth “unauthorized precancel stamp” was done in Montreal. This was the Montreal “21” roller cancel [Figure 2], originally used as a regular postal cancel during the Pence and First Cents issues, after which it was discontinued. About 1888, its use was again continued. It was used to precancel sheets of the Small Queen issue, the 1 cent, 2 cent, 3 cent, 5 cent, 6 cent, and the 10 cent, and a few late issues of the 15 cent Large Queens at minimum. Thus, stamps bearing the Montreal “21” Roller Cancel issued prior to the Small Queen issue are not to be considered precancel stamps.

The Town of Belleville, which was a post office authorized to use precancel stamps with precancel bar cancellations, may also have issued a unique precancel cancellation marking on the 15 cent Large Queen stamp [Figure 3].

In the Robert A. Lee “Harry Lussy” auction of June 1998, reference is made to the issuance of various “unofficial” precancel stamps within the first seven lots of that auction [Figure 4].

Although it was contrary to regulation to use a roller cancelling device to precancel sheets of stamps, many post offices including Brantford [Figure 6], London, Montreal, Ottawa, Quebec, Toronto, and others did so.

London, Ontario, however, was the only known post office to have precancelled the ½ cent Small Queen stamp with a roller cancelling device [Figure 5]. (It is now known that a cover with a block of four of the ½ cent Small Queen stamp with a roller cancelling device, cancelled with a “Berlin” cancel, exists in a private collection.)




Figure 8. London.




Figure 10. Woodstock.




Figure 11. Pugwash.

Other examples of where it was contrary to regulation to use a roller cancelling device to precancel sheets of stamps are seen on the covers illustrated below, for the towns of Brockville [Figure 6], London [Figure 7, 8], Tilsonburg [Figure 9], Woodstock [Figure 10] and Pugwash [Figure 11].

AROUND THE WORLD IN 86 SECONDS

A quick peek at the flags, and number of stamp issues, from countries around the world

VENEZUELA

First stamps issued: January 1, 1859

The flag of Venezuela consists of a horizontal tricolor of yellow, blue and red with the National Coat of Arms on the upper hoist-side of the yellow band and an arc of eight white five-pointed stars centered on the blue band. The current eight stars flag of Venezuela was introduced in 2006.

Est. number of stamps issued (to May '17): 4,515



SURINAME

First stamps issued: 1873

The Flag of Suriname was legally adopted on November 25, 1975, upon the independence of Suriname. It consists of a horizontal triband of green (top and bottom) and red (double width) with large white border with the large yellow five-pointed star centered on the red band.

Est. number of stamps issued (to Mar '20): 3,030



ECUADOR

First stamps issued: January 1, 1865

The national flag of Ecuador, which consists of horizontal bands of yellow, blue and red, was first adopted by law in 1835 and later on September 26, 1860. The design of the current flag was finalized in 1900 with the addition of the coat of arms in the center of the flag.





LET'S TALK EXHIBITING

PARLONS EXPOSITIONS

EXHIBITING CINDERELLA MATERIAL

An often underappreciated area in the world of philately is the collection and exhibiting of Cinderella stamps. Cinderella, in the fairy tale, was treated as an inferior within her family, so the word comes to philately to denote a similarly inferior type of 'stamp' that one might choose to collect. Cinderella stamps look like stamps, but were not issued by a postal authority nor were they issued to pay any particular postal rate. They usually are privately issued labels, produced for the purposes of promoting business, religious, social, political or non-profit groups. A synonymous term is 'poster stamps', and includes commemorative stickers, propaganda labels, charity seals, ration stamps, private savings stamps and the full gamut of stamps issued for non-recognized countries, fantasy countries, or governments. If you collect air mail labels (postal etiquettes) or other postal instructional labels, these too fall within the Cinderella definition.

For our purposes, Cinderellas are a legitimate category of material worthy of competitive philatelic exhibiting, and are so recognized as such in recent editions of the Manual of Philatelic Judging and Exhibiting. They fall within the range of exhibit types possible within both the General class (for multi-frame exhibits), and the Single-Frame class too.

As such, the success of any Cinderella exhibit hinges on the standard expectations for proper treatment and development, importance, knowledge, study and research, rarity and condition, and presentation. Such exhibits are evaluated on these criteria with standard RPSC or APS exhibit evaluation forms. A Cinderella exhibit is eligible for all medal levels, specialist awards (as applicable), and Grand Awards too, so competes on an equal footing with all other types of exhibit categories. The inferior step-child of philately is inferior no more (though some prejudicial attitudes may still linger on among us...).

Let's see how this can be successfully accomplished. Our exemplar here is James (Jim) Taylor's recent exhibit "France 1934: Anti-Tuberculosis 'Stamp' Campaign" which received a Gold Award (with felicitations) at CANPEX 21, our first national virtual one-frame exhibition held this past April, under the auspices of the Middlesex Stamp Club of London, Ontario. Jim's exhibit consisted of eight double-sized pages, properly filling a standard-sized frame as if it were to be physically exhibited on the exhibition floor.

EXPO PARAPHILATÉLIQUE – QUAND CENDRILLON S'INVITE AU BAL

La collection et l'exposition de timbres de paraphilatélie, aussi appelés timbres « Cendrillon », sont un segment souvent sous-estimé dans l'univers philatélique. Cendrillon, dans le conte de fées, était traitée en inférieure au sein de la famille. La philatélie a donc adopté ce nom pour mettre en évidence le caractère tout aussi inférieur attribué à un type de timbres que certains choisissent de collectionner. Ils ressemblent à des timbres-poste, mais ne sont pas émis par une autorité postale ni en vue d'appliquer un quelconque tarif postal. Il s'agit habituellement de vignettes émises privément à des fins de promotion de groupes entrepreneuriaux, religieux, sociaux, politiques ou à but non lucratif. Les termes « timbre-vignette » ou « timbre-réclame » en sont des synonymes et comprennent les autocollants commémoratifs, étiquettes de propagande, cachets de bienfaisance, timbres de rationnement, timbres d'épargne privées et toute la gamme de timbres provenant de pays non reconnus ainsi que de pays ou de gouvernements fictifs. Si vous collectionnez des autocollants par avion (étiquettes par avion) ou d'autres étiquettes informatives, les deux correspondent à la définition de Cendrillon.

Aux fins du présent texte, les timbres Cendrillon forment une catégorie légitime d'éléments dignes d'une exposition-concours philatélique et sont d'ailleurs reconnus comme tels dans les éditions récentes du manuel d'évaluation des expositions philatéliques le Manual of Philatelic Judging and Exhibiting. Ces types de collections sont admis tant dans la classe générale (pour les collections multicadres) que dans la classe à cadre unique.

Dès lors, le succès d'une collection Cendrillon repose sur les normes habituelles liées au traitement, au développement, à l'importance, à la connaissance, à l'étude et à la recherche, à la rareté et à l'état ainsi qu'à la présentation. Ces collections sont évaluées selon les critères indiqués ci-dessus à l'aide des formulaires standards d'évaluation de collections de la Société royale de philatélie du Canada (SRPC) ou de l'American Philatelic Society (APS). Les collections Cendrillon peuvent récolter des médailles à tous les niveaux, des prix de spécialité (le cas échéant), des grands prix et se mesurer à pied d'égalité à n'importe quelles autres catégories de collections. Le bel-enfant inférieur de la philatélie n'est donc plus inférieur (quoique certaines attitudes préjudiciables puissent encore persister parmi nous...).

Voyons comment y arriver. Nous prendrons comme exemple la collection que James (Jim) Taylor a récemment exposée « France 1934: Anti-Tuberculosis 'Stamp' Campaign » (France 1934 : campagne du timbre antituberculeux) qui a reçu un prix Or (avec félicitations) à CANPEX 21, notre première exposition virtuelle à un cadre, tenue en avril dernier sous les auspices du club

His topic was the particular Cinderella stamp issued by the French National Anti-Tuberculosis Committee in 1934 to raise funds in the country's fight against TB that year. Engraved by a prominent designer of several French stamps, and printed to the same size as French commemorative stamps, it was issued in booklets of 20, in imitation of the size of French stamp booklets of the period, and sold by French school children to any and all interested contributors. The label was also issued in sheets of 100 for the benefit of purchasers of larger quantities. The stamp-sized label was used quite regularly, attached to the front or back of postal covers. The stamp-sized label also received occasional overprinting with Metropolitan France Department names, as well as overprinting of a few French Africa colonial names. Three larger labels were also produced, with denominations, intended as window displays for the campaign's supporters, and there was additional advertising ephemera produced for the campaign, often including the image of the stamp-sized label.

Taylor manages to show us the story of this Cinderella stamp through a comprehensive showing of the various items produced for this TB campaign and across the development of his sequence of pages. Let's look at a few pages.

The first page shown here is his Title Page [Figure 1]. Looking like most any other Title Page, he manages to give us an overview introduction to the topic, show us his plan,

Son sujet était le timbre Cendrillon émis par le Comité national de défense contre la tuberculose, réalisé en France en 1934 afin de recueillir des fonds pour la lutte que le pays menait contre la maladie cette année-là. Gravé par le concepteur éminent de plusieurs timbres français et imprimé au même format que les timbres commémoratifs, il fut émis en carnets de 20 pour imiter la taille des carnets français de l'époque. Ils étaient vendus par les élèves des écoles à tous les donateurs désireux de contribuer. Les vignettes étaient aussi vendues en feuilles de 100 à ceux qui souhaitaient en acheter de plus grandes quantités. Celle qui était de la taille d'un timbreposte a été utilisée régulièrement au recto ou au verso de plis postaux. On y a aussi parfois apposé en surimpression le nom de départements de la France métropolitaine ou de colonies françaises d'Afrique. Trois vignettes de grande taille ont aussi été produites avec des valeurs nominales devant servir de vitrine à ceux qui appuyaient la campagne. Des éphémères additionnels ont également été produits et comportaient souvent l'image de la vignette de la taille d'un timbreposte.

Jim Taylor a également réussi à nous montrer l'histoire de ce timbre Cendrillon par une présentation exhaustive des divers articles produits pour cette campagne de lutte contre la tuberculose et par l'élaboration de sa séquence de pages. Examinons-en quelques-unes.

La première page que vous verrez ici est la page titre (figure 1). Une page titre semblable à n'importe quelle autre, où Jim Taylor

and include three philatelic items – an imperforate plate proof (as pre-production material), the complete booklet cover, and its two booklet panes, all in a pleasing and uncluttered presentation.

Next, I show the third page in the frame [Figure 2], depicting the use of the TB stamp on cover, and also showing a photoreduction of one of the advertising posters used to publicize the issue of the label. Note how the text and the philatelic items seem to balance out each other.

Another page shown here [Figure 3] displays an array of the labels with different French Department overprints, including two on cover.

Finally, the last page shown here [Figure 4] displays the three larger labels for the campaign, as well as a proof of the vignette used for the portrait in the label. Note how the larger page format that Taylor uses helps show off his material on these last two pages, perhaps to greater advantage than by using standard-sized pages instead.

Taylor's exhibit of this TB charity seal shows what is possible in exhibiting Cinderella material. Like a traditional stamp exhibit, he shows us preproduction material as well as the issued material in all its formats and varieties. Taking it a step further, he also shows the sort of non-philatelic ephemera (one of his other pages shows a commemorative medal and a jig-saw puzzle also produced for the 1934 TB campaign that additionally depict the label's design), making his single frame exhibit of this topic

réussit à nous offrir l'ensemble du sujet en introduction. Il expose son plan et incorpore trois pièces philatéliques : une planche pour timbres non dentelés (matériel de préproduction), la couverture du carnet complet et ses deux feuillets, le tout disposé de façon agréable et ordonnée.

Ensuite, je montre la troisième page du cadre (figure 2), qui décrit l'utilisation du timbre antituberculeux sur un pli. On y voit également une photoréduction de l'une des affiches publicitaires ayant servi à promouvoir l'émission de la vignette. Remarquez comment le texte et les pièces philatéliques s'équilibrent.

Une autre page (figure 3) illustrée ici montre un groupe de vignettes comportant diverses surcharges de départements français, dont deux sur un pli.

Pour terminer, la dernière page (figure 4) expose les trois plus grandes vignettes de la campagne ainsi qu'une épreuve de l'image utilisée pour le portrait sur la vignette. Notez comment le grand format de page qu'a employé l'auteur contribue à mettre en évidence les pièces des deux dernières pages, peut-être même plus avantageusement que s'il avait utilisé des pages de format standard.

À travers sa collection de vignettes de bienfaisance, Jim Taylor nous dévoile les possibilités qu'offrent les pièces Cendrillon pour une exposition. Comme dans le cas d'une collection de timbres traditionnelle, il nous montre des éléments de préproduction ainsi que ce qui a été émis dans tous les formats et toutes les variétés. Il pousse la chose un peu plus loin en nous proposant des éphémères non philatéliques (l'une de ses autres pages comporte une médaille commémorative et un casse-tête également produits pour la campagne du timbre antituberculeux de 1934 avec une description du dessin

a 'Display' category exhibit in order to more thoroughly explore his topic.

The take-away from this column on Cinderellas is that they can be properly exhibited using the same sort of guidelines that apply to the other sorts of stamp exhibits too. A comprehensive and knowledgeable showing of one's material can reap not only personal satisfaction in a job well done but can lead to quite acceptable awards too.

BOOK REPORTS

GREAT BRITAIN CONCISE STAMP CATALOGUE

Although the 36th edition of the *Great Britain Concise Stamp Catalogue* is not intended to achieve the level of detail found in the *Great Britain Specialized Catalogue* series, it meets its stated objective to provide an intermediate catalogue for collectors of the stamps of Great Britain. Without question, it meets the needs of all but the most highly specialized collectors.

Included in this most recent edition are Britain's definitive and commemorative stamps, regional issues, postal fiscal stamps, print errors, first day of issue covers, booklets, specimen overprints and post office label sheets. Listed also are gutter pairs, presentation packs, 'Smilers' sheets and yearbooks. Listings are complete from the first Penny Black, released May 6, 1840 to the commemorative issues released on March 29, 2021.

Because this catalogue is designed to meet the needs of collectors beyond the beginner stage, its editors have not overlooked to include items such as the wartime issues of the Channel Islands, or the presentation, collector, and gift packs. Booklet panes are listed up to and including the reign of Queen Elizabeth II.

This most recent edition has had many of its images updated, including many of the catalogue's older line-drawn illustrations. For example, among the most significant updates are the Machin booklet pane illustrations. These images have been completely redrawn, which has greatly improved their clarity and, equally important, has eliminated any remaining errors, or other inconsistencies, in the process.

The editors have also included all reported new discoveries to the listings and added new notes, which will be of help in guiding collectors. Despite the plethora of new issues, editors have not found it necessary, for now, to make any number changes in their update of this latest catalogue.

However, with two postal rate changes since the last edition of this catalogue - three in the past 12 months - the "U" series security Machins and "Post & Go" sections, edited by John M. Deering, has seen significant updates, to say the least.

A Machin issue with attached barcode, released in March 2021 is used to illustrate the cover of this new catalogue. The future purpose of the

barcode at this time is not clear, according to editor Vince Cordell, although he suggests some possibilities in his opinion editorial.

The commemorative and miniature sheet design index lists the topics depicted on stamps issued from 1953 to November 2020; the decimal currency issues listed in the index cover the stamp release dates from 1971 to 2020.

With all the changes and major updates in this new volume, it needs to be on the bookshelf of every serious collector of the stamps of Great Britain. ☒

This study of the post office on Quebec territory extends from the year 1763 until the creation of the Post Office on April 5, 1851. This research consists mainly of identifying the localities in which a post office existed, of listing the postmasters who succeeded one another as well as the dates on which they were in office. Also identified are those responsible who transported the mail on the various postal routes, and the frequency of travel.

A complete nomenclature of postmarks used during this period is in addition to illustrations of postal covers.

This volume covers the 71 post offices located to the south and southeast of Montreal, in the Ottawa River and Pontiac. It includes the 10 postal routes that crossed this territory of the province until 1851.

In the appendices: Details of postal routes and transport on the territory; a general biography of the four post office administrators during the period studied; general printed instructions given to post masters to give them a better knowledge of postal operations - several documents are revealed here for the first time; and a directory of postal covers found in the archival documents of Library and Archives Canada in Ottawa and *Bibliothèque et archives nationales* in Quebec city. A cumulative index of the names of offices, post masters, contractors as well as all the names of places and proper names used in this work ends this first volume.

This is the first volume in a series of 4 volumes which will cover the entire territory.



La recherche identifie les localités dans lesquelles un bureau de poste a existé, répertorie les maîtres de poste qui s'y sont succédé ainsi que les dates où ils ont été en fonction, les responsables qui ont transporté le courrier sur les différentes routes postales, et la fréquence des voyages. À la retraite depuis 2008, Cimon Morin a travaillé pendant 30 ans au sein de la fonction publique fédérale en tant que gestionnaire des Archives postales canadiennes (*Archives nationales du Canada*) et des Collections philatéliques (*Bibliothèque et Archives Canada*) de 1988 jusqu'à sa retraite. Auparavant, il était bibliothécaire (1977-1985) et ensuite directeur du Musée national des Postes (1986-1988).

Il est aussi membre fondateur de la Société d'histoire postale du Québec, président (1985-1988, 2008-2012), éditeur du *Bulletin d'histoire postale et de marcophilie* (2008-2020) et récipiendaire du titre de fellow en 2018.
