PLATE NUMBERS ON KING EDWARD VII STAMPS

Mr. Norris, of Bay City, Mich., reports existence of Plate Numbers 71 & 72 of the 1ϕ value. He also has Plate Numbers 1 and 2 of the 5ϕ , 7ϕ and 10ϕ and reports only one plate of the two higher values.

Dr. J. A. Pearce, of Victoria, reports the existence of Plate Number 29 of the 2d value.

MORE INFORMATION RE 10d SPECIAL DELIVERY.

Our member, Mr. J. F. Keen, of Vancouver, reports that he has a T.R. corner block of the shaded variety of this stamp with figure I on top margin, which he presumes is the plate number. He also has a copy of the same variety on piece with a 2ψ 1897 Jubilee postmarked Acton, Ont., June 3rd 04. Come on, boys, look over your used copies for dates previous to 1906 in either type. Just to make it more interesting our member B. R. Marsales, of Hamilton, has shown ye Editor a cused copy with only the shading in left circle.

FROM THE LIBRARY SHELF

In answer to the librarian's request for information regarding varieties to be found on Canadian stamps. Mr. T. P. Gladstone-Shaw of Shawinigan Falls, Que., has forwarded the following list. Needless to say we will be glad to hear from anyone who can identify position of any of them, or add to same.

Half Cent Black, Scott #40 - (1) Dot on bar of 1; (2) Probable re-entry Point of Bust "appears to project below dotted oval over "CE" of cent. Top of letters in "Canada Postage" blurred. Doubling of top of ornamental corner over "G".

Half Cent 1897 Issue (Maple Leaf) - (1) Re-entry. Doubling of right side of stamp noticeable particularly in veins of maple leaves, on lower outside frame line and horizontal shading lower corner. (Shows on both stamps of a mint pair).

Three Cent 1897 Maple Leaf Issue - (1) Work Plate. Distinct white dash in oval before "T" of "Three". (Described by Jarrett).

Two Cent Carmine, Scott #86 - Marks Emco Journal, May 1938, list 9 varieties to be found on this stamp. We reprint them below and then list varieties reported by our correspondent, some of which are no doubt duplicates:-

Listed by Emco Journal: (1) Short extra line on right side of frame (3 line type); (2) Base lines of stamp doubled (4 line type); (3) Extra line outside frame and tablet line doubled left side; (4) Lines at top of stamp doubled; (5) Top lines at left spandrel doubled; (6) Extra line top left corner; (7) Top lines of stamp doubled (3 line type); (8) Doubling under right tablet, also slight doubling of number two

(4 line type); (9) Broken frame centre right (3 line type).

Listed by Mr. Gladstone-Shaw: (1) Strong doubling of lower part of stamp, horizontal shading and horizontal tablet lines distinctly doubled, also bottom frame line and numeral; (2) Vertical lines lower left corner doubled; (3) Horizontal shading and top frame doubled at top left corner; (4) Horizontal lines top left and vertical lines bettom left doubled (an odd combination); (5) Right outer frame line at top and veins of leaf also top right corner doubled; (6) Horizontal line bettom of tablet and bettom frame doubled in lower right corner. (7) Vertical left frame and tablet lines lower left corner and horizontal bettom frame and table lines lower right corner (another odd combination); (8) Right outer table and frame lines doubled; (9) Line

of colour through top of left "2"; (10) Right vertical line left tablet broken between 2nd and 3rd horizontal shading lines (count from bottom); (11) Right vertical line right tablet extends below base line of tablet approx. half way across white space between lower frame and base of tablet. (To be continued).
