NEW PICTORIAL STAMPS

Being Issued on Sept. 16, 1946.

Postage stamps are naturally of great concern to stamp collectors. They are in many ways the corner stone of our system. Certainly no modern postal system could function efficiently and economically for very long without them.

The subjects and designs of Canadian postage stamps have aroused great admiration among the world's philatelists. They may be a matter of real pride because of their international renown.

In these eventful days, when the people of the whole world are endeavouring to turn from wartime pursuits to ways of Peace, many postal administrations are putting out new issues of postage stamps symbolic of the end of hostilities.

Postmastor General Bertrand has instructed that our present pictorial stamps which were first issued in 1942 and 1943 to depict the war effort of the Canadian people, are to be replaced by new designs illustrating the basic industries and raw materials of Canada, which are of such tremendous importance to the future of our country and the world.

Beginning with the basic industry of Agriculture, the stamps will depict

mining, manufacturing, lumbering, fishing, wild life, and transportation.

With the above explanation the reader will be able to discern the deep meaning which underlies the apparently simple designs for our new stamps. For example, the 10-cents denomination shows the quiet sylvan beauty of Great Bear Lake, where the prospector, Gilbert La Bine, first noticed a wall of rock stained with cobalt blue. Following along he found tiny dark pieces of ore about the size of plums. Looking more closely he found the vein which he chipped with his hammer and discovered to be pitchblende, the source of radium and uranium. From this remote place has come the shattering energy of the atomic bomb. Try to imagine how useless it would be for an artist to attempt any adequate pictorial representation of atomic energy on a postage stamp. The Department came to the conclusion that the only way was to appeal to the imagination by force of contrast, by showing the socluded spot as it was before the prospector laid it bare to Science.

THE NEW STAMPS:

8-CENTS: Farm scene in Eastern Canada. Representative of the vital farm products industry, in which the Province of Ontario leads the Dominion.
10-CENTS: View of Great Bear Lake, North West Territories, showing the point at which pitchblende deposits were first found - the source of radium and uranium, Canada's most important contribution to science through her mining industry.

14-CENTS: View of Hydro Electric Power Station on the St. Maurice River, Province of Quebec. Water-power developments such as this are of paramount importance in Canada's manufacturing industry, which was recently stated in Parliament to be her leading industry.

20-CENTS: Shewing the latest type of combined reaper and binder in use on the prairie wheat fields of Canada. The most up-to-date and speedy method of garnering Canada's

wheat crop - her principal contribution to the world's food supply.

50-CENTS: View of logging and pulp mill operations in British Columbia, showing head and second "Fallers" at work with power-saws, a modern method of bringing down trees. The lumbering and pulpwood industries of Canada are major factors in Canada's manufacturing activities and export trade.

Car-ferry operating between Prince Edward Island and the mainland, with \$1.00: typical Canadian fishing-boats. Showing an unusual aspect of Canada's transportation

industry, with fishing-boats representing her fishing industry.

7-CENTS AIR MAIL: Canada Geese in flight, near Sudbury, Ontario. The Canada goose is notable among wild fowl for its speed and endurance, and symbolizes Canada's wild life and natural resources. It is depicted against a background situated in Canada's worldfamous nickel-mining country in Northern Ontario. Canadian wild-life and scenery are powerful attractions for travellers and sportsmen, and form the basis of the country's large and growing tourist traffic. With an annual output of over 250,000,000 pounds, Canada's nickel-mining industry is a vital factor in the manufacturing industries of the entire world.

10-CENTS SPECIAL DELIVERY: The Arms of Canada, with Laurel and Olive branches, symbolic of Victory and Peace. (The Special Delivery stamp prepays a fee for special service, and is not available for postage purposes generally. For this reason the design is chiefly armorial and symbolic. The symbolism is included in response to a widespread demand for some reference, in the new postage stamp issue, to Canada's part

in the achievement of Victory and Peace.)

17-CENTS AIR MAIL & SPECIAL DELIVERY: Air-view of Quebec City, looking North-Fast, and showing the Plains of Abraham in the foreground. Superimposed on the picture is a drawing of the new D.C. 4-M type of aeroplane, now under construction in Montreal for use on the Trans-Atlantic mail and passenger route, and later, as soon as the necessary heavy runways can be provided, on the Trans-Canada run. The most recent development in Canada's transportation industry.

The information supplied to the Directors of the C.P.S. concerning the present 17¢ stamp was referred to Ottawa for confirmation and we quote the reply of Mr. Deaville: "There is no truth whatever in the story that the 17 cents stamp is sold cut, and I cannot imagine how the rumor originated.

The New York Times has noted "so-called" mistakes in our new designs. The 50-cent B.C. Logging Scene shows two lumbermen with their backs to a falling tree and that paper suggests this stamp may become known as the "Suicide Stamp". The 8-cent shows a plow throwing a furrow to the left, whereas, the moldboard is said to throw the earth to the right. This is claimed to be a reversible plow used on hillsides. The Department states: "The designs were taken from photographs and hence can hardly be inaccurate. Experts in agriculture and logging operations have pronounced the stamps perfectly correct and they will not be withdrawn from circulation."

The Fifth Congress of the Postal Union of the Americas and Spain meets during September in Rio de Janeiro. The last meeting was held in 1936 in Panama. Canada's delegation will be headed by Hon. Ernest Bertrand, P.C., K.C., L.A., IL.B., Pestmaster-General, and include W.J. Turnbull, Deputy Postmaster General, Col. E.J. Underwood, O.B.E., F. E. Jollife, with Miss C.E. Bingleman, as Secretary.
