## **Another New Canadian Pictorial**

Official announcement has now been made of a forthcoming addition to the series of Canadian pictorial stamps which have honoured the various natural resources of our Dominion. When the series is complete pictorial values of Canada's current stamps will each illustrate some activity of one of the natural resources which have contributed largely to the economy of the Dominion. Among others, stamps already issued have honoured the mining and the lumbering industries.

On February 1st, a new one dollar stamp will make its appearance and in design it will be dedicated to the activity of the fisheries industry. Green in color and the same size as the present stamp, the main illustration shows a fisherman hauling in a net. Incorporated into the stamp is a border design illustrating various species of fish native to the different provinces and areas of Canada.

The series of stamps undoubtedly serves to acquaint the people of other countries with the wide variety of our natural resources, as well as being a set of high philatelic interest and value. The various stamps have proved to be attractive in design and rank high among the many attractive sets of Canada.

## New Issue News

The latest member of the Royal Family to be pictured on stamps is that of Prince Charles, and the hunour of being the first country to so portray the young prince goes to New Zealand.

# Phil J. McCabe Resigns

Phil's resignation was made to a meeting of Toronto members of the board with the explanation that he had recently purchased a property at Dunbarton, Ont. to which he must devote considerable time and labour to complete alterations he plans to make. This would, for some time, limit the hours available for C.P.S. work, of which there is considerable in a post as important as that of Executive Secretary. In offering his resignation, Phil feels the office should be filled by someone better able to devote the necessary tim e to it.

Subject to discussion by the complete Executive, Mr. McCabe has relinquished his work, and it is expected than an announcement will shortly be made concerning a successor to the office.

Among Mr. McCabe's duties was the direction of the publication of this News Letter. For the time being this is being jointly edited by Mr. Bert Baulch and Mr. George S. Wegg, with correspondence to go to the latter at 15 Richmond St. East, Toronto.

Editorially, we sincerely regret the resignation of Mr. McCabe, and trust his retirement is but a temporary one. "Phil" has been an outstanding figure in the Society for some years and is extremely well known to a host of Canadian and United States philatelists, and the Society can ill afford to lose him. We know his interest in the hobby remains high, however, and we hope that the "stamp bug" will shortly draw him back into active participation in the work of the Society, which he has always endeavored to channel to the benefit of every Canadian collector. ## Silver Wedding Issues Popular

In the Harmer, Rooke & Co. Inc. Auction of Dec 5-6, a group of 66 sets of the Silver Wedding stamps in complete sheets sold in a single lot for \$8.750. The group was part of a large consignment confiscated in England and ordered for auction by the British Government. The whole consignment realized \$41,409.50. Many of the sets and lots realized over half catalogue, and the Falkland Island silver Wedding Issue exceeded full catalogue.

### CAPEX News

As Canada's National Stamp Collector's Society, the C.P.S. are whole-heartedly behind "CAPEX" - the International Stamp Exhibition to be held in Toronto Sept. 21-29, 1951. Consequently, we propose to keep you posted through the News Letter with the plans for this Exhibition as they develop.

Many readers have no doubt received the first prospectus issued some time ago. The second prospectus, giving more information of the Exhibition, has now been issued, and copies will be mailed on request to CAPEX Headquarters.

No stone is being left unturned to make the Exhibition a success, financially and otherwise. CAPEX Directors have just taken out War Risk Insurance with Lloyd's of London, at a rate of 2%, which in effect means Lloyd's were quoting odds of 50 to 1 against a major war forcing cancellation of our Internetional Exhibition this year. The announcement received wide publicity in the press, and the very next day our Prime Minister, Mr. St. Laurent, gave an interview agreeing that he also felt that the present charces against a major war in the next 9 months were about 50 to 1. Even the P.M. reads the CAPEX news, it would seem.

The speaker of the evening, Mr. Albert C. Butzen, Pres. of Michigan Stamp Club and Detroit dealer, presented a most in-teresting telk on cover collecting, showing many interesting specimens and presenting ell present with a souvenir cover from Greenfield Village, Michigan. Mr. Norman Clark, M.C.C. President, was in the chair, and Harry Reader conducted a 50 lot Auction. #### NEWS FROM THE WEST COAST

The Second Annual Exhibition of the B.C. Philetelic Society was held in the Elk's Club Ballroom in the heart of Vencouver on November 3rd and 4th. Although 25¢ admission was charged (for which there were two door prizes to be won) over 500 visitors attended during the two days. The exhibition attracted over 1000 sheets of very excellent meterial, all shown under glass, the Society having discerded the old method of clumsy fremes. Judges from Seattle, Victoria and New Westminster, provided absolutely impartial decisions, and all contestents appeared satisfied with the awards.

All Vancouver newspapers gave it excellent publicity, and The Province added a write up illustrated with a picture of the winning exhibit and of our President, Mr. George Stripp. The "Gold Medal" Award want to Mr. Bradshaw's entry of "Japan", while Mr. Burton Slough's "Saar" exhibit was second. It is unusual for the major prizes to go to foreign exhibits.

In addition to the exhibits we were able to secure Mr. Gerry Wellburn's outstanding exhibit of Postal History which was a winner in the Postal History Society of Great Britain's Exhibition earlier in the year; also Capt. B.C. Binks' Canada exhibit and Mr. Bob Bryen's unique exhibit of the History of Canada in stamps. These added immensely to public interest. West Coast philatelic circles are looking forward to the Northwest Federation Exhibition next May in Victoria, B.C., and also anticipate placing some fine exhibits in the big pect stiff competition from now on.
