CANADIAN COIL STAMPS WITH FAULTY ALIGNMENT

Since my attention was first drawn to this variety early in 1952, on the 2 cents olive-green King George VI issue, and the method of printing these from a single plate of 425 impressions (17 rows of 25 stamps each) being established, my suggestion that it might also occur on the other coil values has been amply proved to be correct. The plates are curved to fit the cylinder of the press, but are not a complete cylinder in themselves. To make the rolls of 500 stamps, without joins, it is therefore necessary to impress the plate 20 times on the continuous roll of paper, the paper being moved into position or register, for each impression. It is possible for this registering to be practically perfect, and then no mis-alignment occurs. Some people have bought coils to obtain the variety and it just wasn't there.

At first, the faulty alignment was a drop, what is called the step-down, but if it were always to step-down, eventually some of the design would have been guillotined off, so I argued that normally the register would be correct, and if the 26th stamp should step down from the 25th, then the 51st stamp could step-up from the 50th, and so on at any multiple of 25. This has definitely been proved in nearly all the George VI Coils.

The mis-alignment varies in depth, both ways the maximum being about 1 millemetre. This is still occurring in the current Queen portrait Coils, but in these the

centering appears to be very faulty between the perforations. In a strip it is not too noticeable, but single copies look very off-centre. It must be remembered that the full printed sheet for the preparation of Coils will contain 8,500 impressions, laid sideways, 17 impressions wide. The perforations come between these rows of 17 along the sides of the stamps, and there should be 501 rows of perforations. I presume it is an automatic operation so bad-centering must mean slightly faulty registering at the commencement. The guillotining, to make 17 Rolls of 500, between top and bottom of the rows appears to be most accurate, and it is this accuracy which accentuates the mis-alignment.

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I would suggest that some collectors, sufficiently interested would obtain permission to watch the printing of these coil stamps at Ottawa, and report on the sequence of the operations, and particularly the centering of the impressions of the Plate on the Roll of Paper. How continuous is the operation? Although the Plate is not a complete Cylinder, does the Cylinder revolve completely between each separate impression? What does the positioning register consist of? When, and how is the perforating Another good question done? would be, when did the present type and set-up of plate and machine first come into operation, printing which issue of Coils. I think all this information should be recorded now to prevent a lot of aimless guessing in the future.

'CANADA'S NATIONAL STAMP WEEK' CELEBRATED IN MONTREAL

Over \$950 Raised For Westminster Abbey Appeal

A great deal of public interest has been aroused in stamp collecting due to the activities of the Society's Chapters in the Montreal area during Canada's National Stamp Week.

Thanks to the fine co-operation given by the Press, Radio, and Television and to the many attractive posters, obtained from the British Philatelic Association, that were distributed by the Westmount Stamp Club and the Union Philatelique de Montreal throughout the city, the efforts made to popularize stamp collecting have been a The highlight decided success. however of the week were the auctions held on the suggestion of the Society for the benefit of the Westminster Abbey Appeal.

The Westmount Stamp Club held its first auction on November 12th when Mayor Roy Campbell of Westmount auctioned off the first lot, a mint copy of the Pound black of Great Britain, and congratulated the Club on their initiative in supporting this Appeal. Mr. Arnold Heckle, the United Kingdom Trade Commissioner in Montreal, also gave a short address and said that he was certain that the support given by philatelists to this Appeal would be deeply appreciated in the United Kingdom.

Over 150 attended the sale, the largest attendance at any stamp auction in Monreal in recent years. The sale realized the sum of \$387. So many lots were received that a second auction took place on No-

vember 19th. Mr. Reg. Haldimand, the president of the club, thanked all those who had helped in making it such a success, especially the Press and Radio for their splendid co-operation. The proceedings were televised.

Mr. A. H. Christensen thanked the club on behalf of the Society for their splendid co-operation and said that he had received several kind letters from England expressing appreciation for the efforts that Canadian philatelists were making on behalf of the Church of the Coronation. Among these was the following letter from Mr. L. J. Gilbert-Lodge, Honorary Secretary of The Royal Philatelic Society, London.

Westminster Abbey Appeal

"I brought your letter and enclosures from the Canadian Philatelic Society before my Council and I am asked to convey to you and your colleagues the deep appreciation your proposed action will bring to all philatelists in Great Britain.

Canada's generosity to the "old country" is well-known and this further expression of support to a cause which is so near and dear to us all will be another link between the philatelists of both our countries. With all good wishes for its success."

A letter was also received from Mr. C. C. Worters, M.B.E., the Secretary of the British Philatelic Association in which he writes. "It is indeed good of you to help in this very practical manner towards an appeal which holds such interest for us all".

At the second sale the Rt. Hon. Lord Shaughnessy auctioned off the first lot, a beautiful album page designed for Canada's Coronation stamp the work of Mr. H. G. Teal, who also donated several other attractive pages which were sold for the fund. The guest speaker was introduced by Mr. W. W. Gear, the club's first vice-president.

In the course of his address Lord Shaughnessy said that having had the great privilege of attending the Coronation of Her Majesty in June and feeling the tremendous spirit exhibited by the peoples of the Commonwealth in that Ceremony it was gratifying to see the members of the club supporting the Westminster Abbey Appeal in this very practical manner.

The auctioneers were Mr. Louis A. Sendel, Mr. J. E. Pickering and Mr. H. C. Kingsley Organ. Mr. Leon Bronstein, Mr. C. J. Malone and Mr. Norman Read assisted Mr. Christensen in running the auctions.

A lot donated by the boys at the Shawbridge Farm and Training School, whose stamp club is now being sponsored by the stamp committee of the Rotary Club of Montreal was bought by Mr. Sendel who generously gave the stamps to several youngsters who were at the auction.

In appreciation for the club's help in raising funds last February for the Governor General's Fund for European Flood Relief several of the Dutch members of the club contributed lots which helped to swell the fund. In all some 170 lots were disposed of at the two sales.

At the second auction the sum realized was \$377. making a total raised by the Westmount Stamp Club of \$764. The Westmount Junior Stamp Club also held two sales for the Abbey fund and made the sum of \$19.25.

The B.N.A. Collectors Club in Montreal also held an auction and have send a donation to the fund of \$100.

Thus the clubs in the Montreal area have raised a total of \$953.25. for the benefit of the Westminster Abbey Appeal.

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BRANTFORD 15TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

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CANADIAN NEWS

For some time now the Canadian Post Office Philatelic Division has kept an up-to-date check list of their available Plate Block stock for the use of their staff in filling the mail orders. While this list is available for examination by the public at the Philatelic Offices it has not been regularly mailed to either collectors or any philatelic publication. Due to the generous cooperation of Mr. Carpenter of that Division, this information will be a regular note in this column and will be brought up-to-date just prior to the printing deadline of each issue of the Canadian Philatelist. It is suggested that Canadian Plate Block collectors file this first list as only supplementary new lists will appear henceforth.

It will be of considerable interest to know that Plate No. 3 of the 4c Q.E. value has not been overprinted "G", nor is it ever likely to be. The definitive Q.E. stamps were the first low value official stamps to come under the new regulation that a plate block could be obtained from the Philatelic Division by only ordering 4 stamps. Collectors took advantage of this and soon exhausted the original supply of the 4c "G" plates, Nos. 1 and 2. A reorder was placed for these same plate numbers, but by that date plate No. 1 and also plate No. 3 were not available and the order was filled with plates No. 2 and 4. As this was quite a large order any further overprintings of the 4c value, if it is necessary before the new design Queens appear, will likely be a much higher plate No., perhaps up around 10 or 11. In other words, this state of affairs now means it will be no longer possible to be sure of collecting official plate blocks in consecutive numbers throughout plate the series of a particular value.

There has also been considerable speculation regarding the rapid advance in the plate numbers of some of the Queen values (e.g. see the 2c at No. 5 and the 4c at No. 6). The question has been asked if each new plate number indicates a new order to the printers or is it that the previous plate has broken? The latter is the correct answer, the plate number is changed, that is, a higher number used, when the plate breaks or faults. It is surprising that such a large number of plates have had to be replaced since a new plate hardening pro-cess has been in use at the printers for some time which was thought would give longer wear than the previous process.

It would almost appear that the new 5c postal rate proposed for April has surprised the new issue

section of the Post Office Department as much as it did the general public. With a 3c and 4c Big Game set (likely illustrating the Beaver and Walrus) and the same values for further Prime Minister stamps in the formative stage it now means that these stamps will probably be changed to 4c and 5c Also the 3c and mixed values. booklets will very likely be dropped in favour of 4c and 5c booklets only. Likewise the 3c coil stamp does not now seem necessary. The Post Office will, however, continue to order the 1c to 5c stamps and also the 7c for North American Continent air mail. Because of the changes suggested above this columnist would guess that the first new stamps to appear in 1954 will be the Big Game issue in April with the new Queens (probably showing the same design with a change in portrait and clearer value figures) appearing not much before the Queen's birthday. The Q.E. II. postal stationery is being printed and collectors can expect a news release concerning this material in the not too distant future.

By and large the items will follow closely the former KG. VI. postal stationary with the Queen's portrait substituted and using the same colour as the current Queen set. The new 10c air letter form is

being printed by the Canadian Bank Note Co. of Ottawa on a new lithographing machine. While this item is a monochrome printing the machine is capable of printing in more than one colour which opens up interesting possibilities regarding the printing of future Canadian stamps.

I have been interested in reading a number of articles regarding relatively recent Canadian stamps that were said to have been found on laid paper. I am given to understand that the Eddy Co. have the contract to supply the stamp paper to the Canadian Bank Note Co. and I have been assured that company does not supply laid paper nor do they have the equipment to manufacture it. I believe this information to be accurate in which case it should settle the "laid paper" controversy.

Another of the official overprint stamps was exhausted at the Philatelic Division on December 15th, the 1946 7c blue air mail stamp overprinted "G". Most of our readers have no doubt seen the official figures released for the number of stamps printed of some of the more recent Canadian issues. However, I am listing three of the "officials" which will bear remembering: \$1 purple Ferry overprinted O.H.M.S., 65,000; \$1 purple Ferry overprinted "G", 60,000; \$1 blue Fish overprinted "G", 40,000.

My closing thought — that the new budget calls for a large number of meter cancelling machines in a large number of government offices—how long will it be before there will be no more official overprinted stamps in use?

CANADIAN PHILATELIC SOCIETY OF GREAT BRITAIN 1953 CONVENTION AND AUCTION

The Convention started with the official opening of the Stamp and Postal History Exhibition in the magnificent main central hall of Glasgow Art Gallery and Museum, so generously loaned by Glasgow Corporation. From Friday 9th to Monday 12th October, Convention covered three invitation papers and displays, statutory meetings, convention auction, judging the competitive entries, the Annual Dinner, a full day's tour of the Western Highlands of Scotland, and finishing up on the last evening with an informal Supper. The main Guest Speaker at the Dinner, Mr. A. B. Holland, Head Post Master of Glasgow, also opened the Exhibition, which continued until 24th October. Awards intimated at the Annual Dinner included a Fellowship of the Society to Mr. F. W. Campbell of Royal Oak, Michigan, for Research and Study, and an award to Mr. Russell Allison of

Niagara Falls for his entry in the competitive classes.

The exhibition which was mainly British North America, ranged from pre-stamp material to the most recent issues of Canada. The museum aspect covered every known form of postal transport and models shown ranged from the Stage Coach to the Trans Canada Air Liner. The standard of exhibits was very high but for considerations of space I mention a few names probably well known overseas and trust others not mentioned will understand. Leo Baresch, 1859 issue and Postmarks; Mrs. Gloria Barratt, Newfoundland; Mr. F. W. Campbell, prestamp covers; J. C. Cartwright, Modern Varieties; W. H. S. Cheavin, X-Ray Photography; W.

The special envelopes with the commemorative cancellation may be obtained from Mr. A. Findlay of P. M. Young Limited, 30 Cowcaddens Street, Glasgow Scotland, who acted as distributing agents for the Society, and who has a reserve of stamped covers on hand to meet possible demands. C. Hinde, Proofs and Essays; T. R. Highton, Pence Issues of Canada; C. W. Meredith, Scots Locals; J. J. Bonar, Queens Maple Leaves and Numerals; President D. Gardner with Vice-President J. J. Bonar and a few Glasgow members contributed the hard work, which was appreciated very much by members.

Her Majesty's Post Office in addition to exhibits granted an exhibition Post Office with a commemorative cancellation which I hope you can reproduce. The official attendance at the Exhibition was 24,979 and the special Post Office dealt with an average of 1000 items per day.

B.N.A. COLLECTORS' CLUB OF MONTREAL

Mr. A. Graham Fairbanks gave a most interesting talk at the annual Christmas party held by the B.N.A. Collectors' Club of Montreal on Dec. 15th.

He illustrated his address with colour slides of specialized material from his collection of Canada which won the Grand Award at BNAPEX 53. Some 100 illustrations were shown of coloured cancellations and postmarks, the better known re-entries, plate flaws and double strikes. Of particular interest were the coloured slides of the plate varieties of the 5 cents Beaver, which illustrated to his audience with remarkable clarity examples of the major re-entry, the log in the waterfall, the leaping fish, the double sun, the split beaver, the "E" break and the blob on the top right frame line to the left of the figure five.

Examples of multiple strikes included the triple strike on the 2 cents Small Queen and a fine example of a double strike on the 6 cents of the same issue. Also two examples of double strikes on the 2 cents George V of 1930.

A most interesting range of cancellations with many examples in colour of the various cancellations and postmarks found on the 19th century issues, from the first rings cancellation of 1851, including examples of the various postal markings that were applied in error on the stamps themselves such as Paid, Registered, Too Late, Free, Late Free, Way Letter, etc. The remarkable clarity of the illustrations shown by the machine, which is one of the first of its type to be used in Canada, made it extremely easy to see and for his audience to be able to recognise the various varieties shown, many of which few collectors have ever had the privilege of seeing.

arrival in Montreal, the On president of the Union Philatélique de Montréal, M. Jacques des Forges, had us go to the Windsor where we met all the officers and directors of the U.P.M. and their wives, and sat down to a bountiful feast. Of course we had to say a few words and announce officially that the offer of the U.P.M. to sponsor the C.P.S. Convention in 1955 in Montreal had been accepted by your Board. I shall draw a veil as to our doings after the dinner, except to say that my wife and I got back to the De la Salle at 3.45 a.m. On the Monday evening, I attended a meeting of the Union Philatélique. There must have been some 150 people present and the greatest activity in trading, buying and selling. I had the very great pleasure of picking up some very interesting items. The U.P.M. also has a very flourishing Junior section.

On the Tuesday, we attended a meeting of the South Shore Stamp Club, at St. Lambert just across the Victoria Bridge. We found, under the guidance of President J. A. Sears and Secretary W. C. Springthorpe, a smaller club than the Montreal ones, but full of enthusiasm and energy. Here also was a flourishing junior section.

Our last philatelic function was the meeting of the Westmount Stamp Club on Thursday. Here again were more than 100 members and a very enthusiastic Junior section. There was a splendid diversity of stamps knocking around, and President Reg. Haldimand and Secretary A. H. Christensen, made us more than welcome.

The Society's genial Vice-President, A. H. Christensen, enter-tained us at his home on two occasions. On the first, I had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Christensen, a most gracious lady, and seeing some remarkable material of Canada and France, which literally made my mouth water. On the second, my kind hosts introduced me to some of Montreal's great collectors, Messrs. De Volpi, Gear and Fairbanks, and also Major Bob Watson, who, everyone will be pleased to learn, is well on the road to recovery after his serious illness, and who was kind enough to show me a collection of Barbados that was a real feast. 1953 ROYAL TOUR BRITISH WEST INDIES to AUSTRALASIA

So far details have been announced of Ten Colonies and Dominions to be visited by Queen Elizabeth II and H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh, which are issuing special stamps for the Royal Tour which covers Aden, Australia, Bermuda, Ceylon, Fiji, Gibraltar, Jamaica, Kenya, Malta, and New Zealand.

As face values are provisional I am booking orders with a nominal deposit and any balance or refund can be settled on delivery of the stamps.

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THE C.P.S. LIBRARY

With this issue of The Canadian Philatelist you will receive a copy of the new Catalogue of the material in the C.P.S. Library. This is the first time such a printed list has been available for the use of C.P.S. members and we hope that you will keep it and have it available for ready reference the next time you require the services of the Librarian.

As new material is added to the Library it is proposed to issue supplements which you can then file with this catalogue, a practice which will enable members to have an up to date file of library material at all times.

In addition to the catalogues, books and pamphlets listed in this catalogue, your Librarian carries complete files of clippings on every conceivable philatelic subject and country. These files consist of articles which have been clipped from newspapers and philatelic publications over a considerable period, and have then been classified under appropriate headings so that you may secure from the Library a file of assorted information on any particular country, or any class of collecting, just by asking for it by name.

The catalogue, and the clipping file, reflect great credit upon our Librarian, Mr. Herbert Buckland, for upon examination it is immediately evident that they represent many, many hours of painstaking examination and sorting and filing before it was even possible to compile the list. We congratulate Herb. on his excellent work, which will be greatly appreciated by the membership.

As you know, any of the material listed is available to members on request. With the exception of a few of the rare and valuable volumes, it can be borrowed without other charge than the payment of two-way postage. In the case of the few exceptions a small rental charge is made.

The issuing of this catalog will probably result in a rush for some of the material. Look it over and if interested write Librarian Herbert Buckland, Port Perry, Ont., who will fill requests for material in the order received.

The interesting article on the Pem & Bina stamp twins in the Oct. issue, brought to my mind the fact that there was also a P.O. on the Canadian side of the border named Pembina. This P.O. was established July 1st 1871 but how long it existed is rather uncertain. I have a cover with Pembina, Man. postmark of July 1st, 1873 but have seen no others. This P.O. was apparently merged into or superseded by West Lynne-which Boggs on page 712 states was established July 1st, 1871-I think this date is incorrect as on page 697 he gives date of establishment West Lynne as July 1st 1878 and local information seems to incline to believing that West Lynne was opened some time previous to 1878. From enquiries I have made I think West Lynne opened when Pembina closed -mainly because the Pembina, Man. was rather confusing-with Pembina, North Dakota just across the border. The Emerson P.O. was established in 1878 and it seems that West Lynne must have been closed at that time or shortly after.

If any readers have any definite information on the early history of these P.O.'s I would like to hear from them. Would more particularly like to know dates of postmarks of West Lynne.

Jhe Realm Of Stamps

Her Majesty's world tour, with the Duke of Edinburgh, is being closely followed by people everywhere and especially by collectors of the Elizabethan issues. The Royal visit stamps promise to be extremely popular. So far the demand seems to have been far greater than the supply and collectors would do well to make sure of securing their sets of these interesting stamps.

At first it was reported that Tonga was going to overprint locally the 8d. value commemorating the Royal Visit but it has since been announced by the Crown Agents that the proposed Royal Visit stamp will not be issued. Advices from England report that owing to the unprecedented demand the Government of Tonga decided to withdraw the issue as they were unable to supply even a fraction of the requirements.

Two values of the current set of Bermuda, the 3d and ¹/₃ have been overprinted THREE POWER TALKS, DECEMBER, 1953, in two lines, commemorating the recent Conference held on the island. Examination of some of the sheets show various broken letters in the overprints on several of the stamps.

The Crown Agents have announced the following new issue dates in January. Bahamas, a new definite issue of 16 values from $\frac{1}{2}$ d. to £1. on January 1st. Stamps of the previous issue withdrawn from sale at the close of business on December 31st.

Tristan da Cunha, a new definite issue of 14 values from ½d. to 10/- on January 2nd. Stamps of the overprinted issue withdrawn from sale at the close of business on January 1st.

Barbados, new value 5 cents on January 4th.

Hong Kong, a set of 12 stamps with Royal portrait changed and new values and colours from 5 cents to \$10 released for sale Jan. 5th. The equivalent values of the former issue together with the 1, 2, 4, 8 and 80 cents stamps would be withdrawn from sale at the close of business on Jan. 4th.

Dominica, Royal portrait changed 4 and 8 cents will be released for sale Jan. 15th. These values of the previous issue will be withdrawn from sale at the close of business on January 14th.

Aden—Kathiri State of Seiyun, the new definite issue of 10 values from 5 cents to 10/- will be placed on sale Jan. 15th. Stamps of the overprinted issue will be withdrawn from sale at the close of business on Jan. 14th.

The Crown Agents have also announced that the following new printings have been ordered with the Royal portrait changed. Cayman Islands, the ½d, 1d, 1½d, 2d, 2½d, 6d and 9d values, Grenada, the 3 cents and 4 cents values.

It is learned that three more low values are to be added on Jan. 18 to the current set of Great Britain, the 3d violet in the design of the 2½d and the 6d purple and in 7d yellow-green in the same design as the 5d value. These will be overprinted and surcharged for use in the British Post Offices overseas.

The United States Post Office Department are to be congratulated on the very fine co-operation given to Philately at the National Postage Stamp Show in New York in November. Not only did the Department provide a wonderful exhibit of some 30 frames for the exhibition, but they also arranged to make the first day of issue of the New York 300th anniversary commemorative stamp at the show. A special Post Office was operated for servicing first day covers. In addition the Bureau of Engraving and Printing installed presses at the Armory so that the public could actually see the new stamps being printed.

Figures now released by the United States Post Office Department show the following first day

sale figures of the 3 cents 300th anniversary of the New York City commemorative stamp at New York on Nov. 20th. Covers cancelled 387,914. Stamps sold 2,570,679. Value \$77,120.37.

A new 3 cents stamp issued to commemorate the 200th anniversary of Columbia University was placed on sale at New York on Jan. 4th. The design of the stamp shows a frontal view of the Low Memorial Library at Columbia University. The colour of the stamp is blue.

The United Nations Postal Administration have announced that the first commemorative stamp to be issued in 1954 will honour the activities of the Food and Agricultural Organization, one of the specialized agencies of the United Nations. The design shows a head of wheat as a symbol of the agency being honoured. The stamp was de-signed by Dirk Van Gelder of the Netherlands. The printing is being done by Thomas da la Rue of London by a double engraving process in two colours. The 3 cents stamp in gold on a green background and the 8 cents in gold on a blue background.



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We noticed that the British Publication, the Stamp Collectors' Annual, listed only three Canadian Stamp Clubs (all of Vancouver, or vicinity), and therefore made up a list of all the C.P.S. Chapters and sent it on to Tom Morgan, the editor. We are pleased to announce that all these will appear in due course. We recommend the Stamp Collectors' Annual to all collectors. For half a crown (about 45 cents), it is a really worthwhile publication and is packed with interesting information for philatelists of all kinds. It is published by the "Philatelic Magazine."
