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### Jhe Realm Of Stamps

#### **By Montor**

**T**WO REALLY excellent books have recently been published which are inexpensive, beautifully illustrated and contain a wealth of information invaluable to the collector.

The first is the second edition of "British Colonial Stamps in Current Use", by R. Courtney Cade, M.B.E., of the Colonial Office, which has been published by the Crown Agents and is obtainable from the Crown Agents Representative, 1800K Street N.W., Washington 6, D.C., U.S.A., at the price of \$1 post free.

contains some 150 pages It describing the stamps in use and brought up to date to the end of October and contains details of the population and currency, together with a map showing the location of the Territories of the stamps described in the text. Besides illustrating the designs there is a wealth of information in the descriptions of the subjects depicted on the pictorial stamps and for those interested in postal markings there is in many cases a list of post offices in the various Territories.

This really excellent handbook cannot be too highly recommended and is especially valuable to the junior providing as it does a great deal of information in concise and interesting form about the British Colonial Territories. It would make a valuable addition to every public and school library in the country.

The second book is written in French and has been published by the Monaco Postal Authorities and portrays the history of the Principality by its postage stamps.

It is entitled "Histoire de la Principaute de Monaco par ses Timbres-Poste" and has been compiled by H. Chiavassa, Chef des Emissions à l'Office des Émissions de Timbres-Poste, Monaco, from from which office it may be obtained, price 350 francs post free.

It contains much detailed infor-

mation commencing with a biography of Prince Rainier III and chapters are devoted to the Prince of Monaco, the Postage Stamp Museum, and to the various pictorial issues that have been made by the Principality.

Many of the stamps are illustrated and there are a number of full page illustrations of local views and reproductions of the portraits of the early Princes of Monaco. It is invaluable for the writing up of a collection of the stamps of this popular country.

A very fitting gesture was made at the first meeting of 1956 of the Westmount Stamp Club when three members, T. Kearney, J. C. Picker-ing and R. J. Sutherland, were made honorary life members of the club. Mr. Kearney and Mr. Pickering together with R. H. M. Falls, the club's first president, are the only three surviving original mem-bers of the club. Mr. Falls was made the club's first honorary member on the occasion of its 600th meeting on April 17, 1952. Mr. Sutherland joined the club several months after its inauguration. like the others is a past president and for the past twelve years has served as honorary treasurer. This idea of honouring in this way those who were responsible for the formation of the club and who have been its active supporters throughout the years, might well commend itself to other Chapters of the Society.

Indications are that stamp collecting is enjoying the greatest boom that it has ever experienced in its history. More and more people both children and adults are taking an interest in philately. There is a persistent demand for fine material not only of Canada but also for the stamps of the British Colonial Territories and the classics of older countries of the world. Reports from London indicate that in England, where Canadian stamps are adjudged the most popular of all with collectors, that prices are quite considerably higher than here. The demand is immense and what little comes on offer is eagerly snapped up at high prices. The interest in the stamps of Canada in the United States is also growing rapidly, the emphasis being laid on exceptional pieces in choice condition.

Now that some of the stamps of Great Britain are appearing on paper watermarked with the new St. Edward's Crown, it is anticipated that the Crown will be changed on new makings of the paper for the British Colonial stamps. It might therefore be wise for collectors of these issues to make sure of completing their sets when they are still available at new issue prices.

The National Stamp Exhibition "Stampex 1956" was again held in London this January under the auspices of the J.P.S. and the P.T.S., the theme being "What Makes Stamp Collectors". A feature of the exhibition this year were the two frame displays by some thirteen specialist societies and study circles. The Canadian Philatelic Society of Great Britain showing two frames of Canada. Two frames of rarities from the Caspary Collection were also on display at the Exhibition.

The composition of the jury for the Fifth International Philatelic Exhibition "Fipex", which is being held in the New York Coliseum from April 28 to May 6, has been announced by Richard S. Bohn, chairman of "Fipex". There will be a total of 51 jurors, under the chairmanship of Theodore E. Steinway, 19 of whom are from outside the United States. Canadians who will act as judges are Vincent G. Greene and C. M. Jephcott of Toronto.

Approximately \$20,000 worth of prizes will be awarded at 'Fipex", which are being furnished by the firm of Cartier of New York, London and Paris. The Grand Award will be a sterling silver ewer valued at more than \$2,000. The deadline for entries has been ad-

vanced one month until February 15 so as to allow additional time for overseas collectors to enter their material. As of January 6 the Directing Committee of "Fipex" had received applications for more than 1,200 frames.

Major Adrian E. Hopkins, M.C., of Bath, England, the Hon. Editor of "The Bulletin", the journal of the Postal History Society, is coming over with his wife and daughter to attend "Fipex". A Postal History Society lunch will be arranged during the Exhibition, following the precedent of the very successful gathering at "Capex" in 1951. During his six weeks' stay on this side of the Atlantic Major Hopkins is hoping to visit both Toronto and Montreal to make contact with members of the P.H.S. in Eastern Canada.

At the time of this writing it is only three months until many of us will meet in Windsor from April 26 to 28 for the 28th Annual Convention of our Society. The Windsor Y Stamp Club are acting as host club and a very successful and interesting Convention and Exhibition is assured. These annual events do much to stimulate interest in philately in Canada and every member of the Society should give them their fullest support.

Quite obviously many cannot undertake the journey to Windsor but it is hoped that those who may be coming through from the Coast and from Western Canada to attend "Fipex" may plan to break their journey at Windsor and take in our Convention on their way to New York. If you cannot attend then enter your material in the Exhibition or at any rate see that your Chapter sends in an entry for the Inter Club competition for the Ford Trophy.

NORWAY. A 35 ore red and a 65 ore blue have been added to the current series bearing the portrait of Kink Haakon VII. These new values have been made necessary by the enhancement of the postal rates on January 1.

SPANISH GUINEA. Set of three values—5c. plus 5c., 15c. plus 5c., and 70c. showing monkeys, issued November 23.

SPANISH SAHARA. Set three values — 5c. plus 5c., 15c. plus 5c., and 70c. — showing Gazelles, issued November 23.

UNITED NATIONS. 3c. and 8c. stamps will be issued honouring the International Telecommunications Union on February 17, the World Health Organization on April 9, United Nations Day on October 24, and Human Rights Day on December 10.

UNITED STATES OF AMER-ICA. A 3c. stamp with first day sale at Philadelphia, Pa. on January 17, illustrated on page 6, to commemorate the 250th anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin. Design is taken from a painting entitled "Franklin Taking Electricity from the Sky" by Benjamin West.

Ten further new stamps have been announced for 1956 as follows: 3c. Labor Day; 3c. 20th anniversary of Nassau Hall, Princeton University; 3c. Booker T. Washington Centennial; 3c. Wildlife Conservation (three stamps); also a 3c. commemorative, and 11c. souvenir sheet, a 2c. postal card and a 6c. air mail envelope in honour of the Fifth International Philatelic Exhibition in New York.



WEST GERMANY. A 20 pf. red stamp to commemorate Heinrich v. Stephan (1831-1897) who entered the Postal Service in 1848 and was later concerned in the formation of the Universal Postal Union. Authorized printing 10 million on paper watermarked "DBP." issued January 7. Illustrated above.

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#### REVIEW

CANADIAN STAMPS WITH PERFORATED INITIALS, BNAPS Perfin Study Group—In the ever-increasing struggle to find an inexpensive side-line, stamps with perforated initials have certainly come to the fore lately. It began with the OHMS perforations, and now it has come to the host of private perforations which have been extant in Canada and other countries since quite a while back.

The present study is due, in the main, to our friend Bob Woolley, but several members of the group have contributed thereto, Dr. C. M. Jephcott, P. D. von Oudenal and Earl Forney. The result is quite a fascinating little booklet, which should be in the hands of all students of this type.

We are interested to discover that these stamps, known as Perfins in Canada, are called SPIFS (Stamps perforated with initials of Firms in Great Britain.

One of the surprises we found in this handbook is the fact that some firms, such as International Harvester and New York Life, use distinctive perforations in their various branches or offices. This certainly complicates the question.

All in all, a useful little handbook, and for its modest price of \$1.00 a copy, we recommend it to all who want to go in for an interesting sideline. Copies can be obtained from R. J. Woolley, 359 Ellis Park Road, Toronto 3, Ont. A copy is also available in the Society's Library.

#### NORTH TORONTO STAMP CLUB EXHIBITION, MARCH 24-25.

The North Toronto Stamp Club (CPS Chapter 5) announces that its 13th annual exhibition will be a two-day affair this year, a new departure. The display at North Toronto Memorial Gardens, 180 Eglinton Ave. West, will be open free of charge to the public on Sat., March 24 from 1:30 to 10:00 p.m., and on Sunday, March 25. from 1:30 to 6. It is expected that some 200 frames of stamps will be on display.

The feature attraction will be a selection from one of the outstanding collections on this continent, an extremely fine exhibit of some early European clasics. In addition will be seen two very important exhibits of material rarely if ever seen on display. One of these is a complete collection of Swahililand. This East African territory was transferred to Great Britain by Germany in exchange for Heligo-land. Before World War II there were only 25 compete collections of Swahililand in existence, most of which were destroyed or damaged in the bombardments of Hamburg. The second exhibit is a probably unique collection of essays, die proofs, color proofs and book-lets of Bavaria, (1911-20, Kingdom to Republic). This is the only time that these will be shown intact. for the owner intends to break up the collection.

On Saturday, March 24, there will be a bourse at which visitors may examine or purchase material from the CPS and NTSC sales books, and from the stock of some of the leading dealers of the Toronto area.

EASTER SEALS ADOPTED IN ALL TEN PROVINCES

Many readers will be interested to learn that the National issue of Easter Seals first printed in 1949 in English as well as English and French will for the first time this year be distributed in each of the ten Canadian Provinces.

Public distribution which is made by Provincial Organizations, affiliated with the Canadian Council for Crippled Children and Adults, will be made in March.

Meantime, the various collector items including Blocks, Imperfs., P.C.P.'s, in sets of all years or individually, will be made available.

Interest in these Seals has grown considerably since first issue; the designs are distinctive and attractive, mostly in several colours making them a nice addition to any stamp collection. For those who have not got the
