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Typical Seebeck reprints

Seebeck Reprints

The impact that these issues have made on the stamp collecting world has been so deep, that the name Seebeck in philately is almost synonymous with the term reprint. Applies particularly to certain Latin American Stamps named after Nicholas F. Seebeck who was associated with the Hamilton Bank Note Company. Between 1890 and 1899 he contracted to supply each year a new set of stamps to Ecuador, Honduras, Nicaragua and Salvador. No charge was made for these stamps but it was agreed that all unsold stamps of a replaced issue were to be made invalid for postage and returned to Seebeck. He also had the right to use the original plates to make reprints. The compensation Seebeck derived was from the sales of such stamps to collectors and dealers at a fraction of the face value.

The Seebeck reprints can be identified by the thick porous paper on which they were printed, whereas the originals are on a thinner and stiffer stock. An original specimen is much more prized when it is on an actual used cover. Although many years have elapsed since they were issued, the status and importance of these Seebeck reprints are still controversial. However, there is no doubt that the attractiveness of these stamps and their enterprising promotion did much to draw many new recruits into the field of philately.




Hong Kong

The small European Republic of San Marino, starting in 1973 has issued a series of pairs of stamps honouring the great cities of the world. Their 1997 offering honoured Hong Kong, in part because this British colony was about to be turned over to China. The two stamps show the city as it appeared in 1897 and in 1997.

Hong Kong has a troubled history for the past 150 years. As a result of the "Opium Wars" of the 17th century, Hong Kong was ceded to Britain in 1841. In 1860 the area was expanded and in 1899 China granted Britain a 99 year lease, that expired in 1997 when the Colony became a part of China. In 1909 a cyclone claimed 10,000 lives in the colony and from 1941 to 1945 The Japanese occupied Hong Kong. Still the city of Hong Kong survives as a major centre of business and commerce representing a bridge between China and the West.

The philatelic history is also of interest. From 1862 Hong Kong issued stamps similar to other British colonies, showing the various Kings or Queens of Britain. Since the turnover to Chinese authority, the have issued twice as many stamps in 20 years as were issued under British rule in more than 130 years. It had been anticipated that only Chinese stamps would be used in Hong Kong, but they quickly learned that by issuing separate stamps from their new territory they could sell even more stamps, largely to collectors. This targeting of the philatelic community is evident in the attractive, often topical issues of the past 20 years; a fine example is their annual lunar new year issue.
