#### The Incomparable McLaughlin-Buick

In the 1960s, I was working in Oshawa and was very aware that the auto industry was the dominant employer in the area. General Motor's Board Chairman R.S. (Sam) McLaughlin's home was almost a shrine in that city. I was therefore pleased to see the McLaughlin-Buick appearing on a stamp in 1993, and again reprinted in a new denomination for CAPEX 96 in 1996.

The McLaughlin Motor Car had been Sam's proud creation and when he joined General Motors his automobile became their new standard of excellence, with the slogan "Only one Grade - and that The Best". Before joining with Chevrolet to form General Motors in 1918, they built 2859 McLaughlins in 1916. Buick, a division of General Motors had long used the slogan "When better cars are built, Buick will build them". In a May 1922 issue of the Canadian Motorist magazine the following slogan appeared "Better cars are being built, and McLaughlin is building them". For the next 20 years the name of the luxury car built in Oshawa was the McLaughlin-Buick.

Mrs. Timothy Eaton had set a precedent when she ordered her McLaughlin-Buick painted Apple Green and with Dark Green leather upholstery, in an age when it was rare to have a car any colour but black. The McLaughlin-Buick shown on the stamp was built specifically for the Prince of Wales (later King Edward-VIII) for his tour of Canada in 1928. Since the car was a "Special Car for Royalty" it was not such a departure to have it painted Silver with Green trim.

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# The "Why" behind the Stamp



Issued 6 June 1980 to mark the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of "O Canada"

# O Canada!

Initially called "Chant national", O Canada was written in French by Sir Adolphe-Basile Routhier. Calixa Lavallee composed the music. It was first performed in Quebec City on June 24, 1880 at the Saint Jean-Baptiste celebration at the French-Canadian National Congress. Soon it spread across the country. Robert Stanley Weir wrote the most popular English version in 1908 (The words were Revised/updated in 2016).

On March 15, 1967, a parliamentary committee recommended that the music of "O Canada" be adopted as the National Anthem. The French version remained unchanged. On July 1, 1980, "O Canada" as we know it today was proclaimed as the National Anthem 100 years after it was first sung in Quebec City.
