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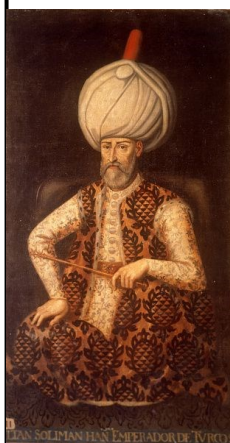
A Tail of Two Turkeys, Maybe More

No one is really sure how the turkey got its name.

A story I have heard is that the bird's striking feathers and tail remind some of what they thought Turkish sultans looked like in their royal finery.

Another is that the birds originally arrived in England on a ship that first stopped in the eastern Mediterranean, and where they came from was first confused.

Either way, the North American wild turkey (*Meleagris gallopavo*) is only one of two living species. The second is the ocellated turkey (*Meleagris ocellata*) that lives primarily on the Yucatan Peninsula of Mexico, Belize, and in parts of Guatemala.

Turkeys have been around for a long time. The earliest turkey fossils date from the early Miocene, about 23 million years ago. Fossil

turkey bones have been found in many places, and many fossil species have been named, but only a few are still considered valid.

Two recently extinct species are known. The (*Meleagris californica*) had a limited range from the area north to Santa Barbara. Turkeys are do well in deserts, so were isolated from the It became extinct about 10,000 years ago. It is a in the La Brea tar pits in Los Angeles.

The southwestern turkey (*Meleagris crassipes*) was found in Arizona and New Mexico. It also became extinct around 10,000 years ago.

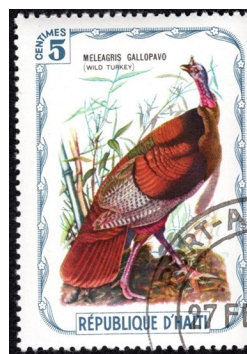
The date of those extinctions coincide with the extinction of the larger mammals, such as mammoth, camels, and horses from North America. Like them, the increasing pressure of hunting, along with climate change, probably added together to lead to their extinction.

Some people today think the first turkey was eaten by the English colonists in 1621. However, the Mayans were domesticating and feasting on turkeys long before. And of course, there are those indigenous peoples that hunted them over 10,000 years ago.

Modern domestic turkeys are not brilliant animals, but there is no truth to the idea that they will look up at rain and drown.

However, wild turkeys are smart and fiercely territorial. I, personally, have been chased for about a half mile by turkeys after they attacked and dented my truck.

In a much-quoted letter, Benjamin Franklin wrote his sister that turkeys were to be admired. But he never advocated the bird to be a national symbol. He much preferred the eagle.

Another Measured Moment.....

Christmas Island

I expect that most of us are aware that Christmas Island, Nova Scotia has for many years used a special Postmark during November and December; as we have had our *BULLETIN* mailed from that location at least 3 times.



In 2021, I sent several Christmas Cards there in hopes of getting their special postmark. A few friends gave back the envelopes, as they know that they are of interest to me. This year I got a surprise! Since I had sent them early they arrived before the first of November, and received an additional

mark, "First Day of Issue", marking the first day that the unique postmark was used.

Perhaps the extra time I have had in my Stamp Den, due to the Pandemic, has had an



unexpected result, as I was able to get started early on Christmas Cards, and they were in the mail earlier than usual.

As I also collect the stamps of Christmas Island, Australia; in 2011 I contacted them and sent a number of Cards to have their Christmas stamps applied and mailed back here to Canada. Their only "Special" Office First Day Cancel, but it did have a Christmas theme. One thing I enjoy about their stamps is the variety of Christmas stamps; sometimes religious themes and sometimes a more humorous theme. It is interesting that with only a small population of Christians Christmas Island is mainly a variety of religions represented, predominantly Moslem and other Asian religions.



Since 1989, they have annually issued stamps to mark the Chinese {Lunar} New Year, and these have become some of their most popular stamps. But I still prefer their Christmas stamps and get a smile when I see Santa riding on a frigate bird, or going snorkeling.
